CRIMINAL.

The case was ordered continued for the term and set for trial the first day of April term, 1909. Order admitting to bail in \$5,000 which was furnished and sheriff ordered to discharge the prisoner from custody.

GRAND JURY REPORT.

In the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon for Harney County. In the matter of the Final Report of the Grand Jury for the Oct. 1908 term of said court.

Comes now the Grand Jury in the above entitled court and hereby submits the following final report of its proceedings, and ask to be discharged.

We have been in session for a period of four days, during which

time we have examined into all matters brought to our attention, of which we have any knowledge, and have returned into this court two true bills of indictment, and one not true bill of indictment.

We have examined the offices of the county and find all kept neatly, but we have attempted to examine into the finances of the county, thinking that such matters should be left to persons better qualified for such work.

We have examined the county jail and find the same well and neatly kept, but desire to recommend that a new concrete floor be placed in the jail, and that the steel cage or cell be moved against the wall of the building in order that prisoners may not have an opportunity to dig through the back wall of the building.

We have examined the court yard and grounds and find the same to be kept in excellent condition.
