 Community advertising has reached a climax in Oregon, and the Oregon Advertising Conference under the auspices of the Oregon Development League will be held in Eugene on Tuesday, May 4th, at the Eugene Commercial Club. The Secretary, J. W. Williams, and President of every organization in the state are expected to be present on this occasion to participate in a discussion which cannot be otherwise beneficial to all concerned.

All the visitors will meet at the Eugene Commercial Club Tuesday morning, May 4th, at 9:30, when a local committee will take them for a ride over the city to show what has been accomplished in the way of paving streets, new parks and buildings, with a brief stop at the State University. A business conference will convene promptly at 1:30 in the afternoon at the Commercial Club rooms, and the entire afternoon will be devoted to a discussion of work actually accomplished by the different organizations.

No state in the Union has carried forward an advertising campaign superior to that now being handled by the Commercial bodies of Oregon. Every organization and every officer has different ideas, and this conference is called in the hope that all may be benefited, and that each one present will be able not only to give but to receive information, advice and instruction which will be of service to the individual communities, and for that reason I greet help to the state at large.
