ANCIENT EXHIBIT.

Seattle, Wash., May 10.—Some enthusiastic antiquarian at the national capitol has gone back three million years to fish up an exhibit for the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition.

A letter from the government exposition agent describes it as a "mummified dinosaur, or trachodon," but even if it is worse that it will be an acceptable addition to the old timers who will gather by the lakeside when the gates open in June.

Not much of Mr. Dinosaur's antecedents is known, nothing in fact, except that he died suddenly in Wyoming on an extremely hot day. Judging from the position in which the remains were found by Charles H. Sternberg, it died with its feet in the air and then lay out in the heat for two or three thousand years which, fortunately for posterity,

made it a mummy instead of a dislocated skeleton, for the skin of the beast is intact, although very much wrinkled as becomes ripe old age. It will be properly mounted and brought to Seattle as a part of the government exhibit.

THIS IS DIFFERENT.

In Secretary Ballinger, Mr. Pinchot seems to have encountered an official that is familiar with something else besides the theoretical side of forest preservation, forest reserves, etc. Under the former administration, millions of acres of land were withdrawn from public settlement in order to create forest reserves, many of them of questionable value. Included in these reserves are unnumbered millions of feet of timber, which is now fully ripe and deteriorating in value every year that it remains uncut. To prohibit the cutting of this timber is to sanction its destruction, as it is worthless if it remains uncut any longer. Mr. Ballinger now refuses to grant the request that further withdrawal of land be made for the forest reserve purpose, until it is shown that there is need of such reserves—Oregonian.

Later—When this matter was brought before President Taft, at a cabinet meeting, he informed Mr. Ballinger that the policies of the former administration are to be carried out to the letter, to which Mr. Ballinger replied that he would be glad to do so.
