(Portland Correspondence). Festivity has marked the past week in Portland. Business cares have been relegated and all have given themselves up to the enjoyment of the spectacles and social functions of the Rose Festival.

When the festival closed Saturday night in a blaze of glory, it was pronounced the most successful affair of the kind ever held on the Pacific Coast.

On Cultivation of The Soil.

The importance of frequent and thorough cultivation of the soil is now admitted to achieve the largest crops. This knowledge was known to the ancients, who worked the land with primitive implements. Even the untutored Indian with his stone hoe stirred the ground around his plants of corn to stimulate their growth.

The initial preparation of the soil for perfect cultivation is performed by the plow, which stirs and turns over the soil to a uniform depth. Modern plows are

manufactured for all kinds of soil, from the stiff clay to the light, sandy loams and the fine, smooth, black land of the prairie. The angle of the moldboard determines the compactness or disintegration of the field that has been plowed. The fine, black prairie loams need the highly polished steel plows with oblique angled moldboards to turn the soil. An obtuse angled plow will choke in fine, black loam, but will work admirably in sandy loams. The sharp-angled moldboard throws the furrow over with great force, making the land friable and easily cultivated.

Working the soil in turn makes the soil work. Cultivation performs the two-fold purpose of liberating plant food and destroying weeds. The earth has been cursed with weeds to compel man to work for his bread. Tilling the soil makes it loose and friable and permits the roots of plants to more easily appropriate the nourishment of the soil.
