The disease spreads from one to another until presently every unit in the herd is affected. The 10 per cent of diseased animals of today may be 15 or 20 per cent tomorrow, and 30 per cent the next day. No farmer or stockman can afford to permit this stealthy slaughter of his animals. A reckoning has to come, and the sooner it comes the less the cost will be. This is the situation from the mere financial standpoint, without taking account of the peril to human life. It is a condition on which cattle owners cannot afford to shut their eyes, for it is a condition attested by the revelations of science and the experience of practiced men.

The fact that leading stockmen like the members of the Pure Bred Livestock association are taking up the issue is an excellent omen. It is said that growers, large and small, all over the state are rapidly gravitating toward the view that a movement for ridding Oregon herds of tuberculosis must soon be begun.
