

Farmers Deserve High Prices.

Farmers in the country feel little sympathy with workers who swarm cities and fight and boycott and strike for higher wages in order that they may keep pace with "higher cost of living."

Farmers complain that they are simply compelled to get along with the work they can perform alone, as they say it is utterly impossible to employ dependable help that will remain with them and be contented.

Farmers could produce cheaper pork, mutton and milk if they had the necessary help, but they can't get it, so the best of them keep toiling 16 hours a day—twice as long as the eight-hour workers in the city—in order that they may get their work done.

If the farmer does the work of two or more men, as every successful one nowadays must, is he not entitled to high prices for his products on the city workers doctrine of extra pay for extra work, if on no other? Let it be known that the farmers lot is no "snap" even in these days of high prices.

The farmhand will have more to show for a year's work than will his average eight-hour brother in the city who must spend all he makes and then feel that he has not enough of the world's or his own labor's product.—Oregonian.

INDUSTRIAL NOTES.

(Portland Correspondence.)

The sale of the big land grant of the Willamette Valley & Cascade Mountain Road company during the past week to capitalists said to represent the Hill interests indicate to many that the reported Pacific Coast outlet for the Burlington will become a reality.

It is expected to complete the jetty at the mouth of the Columbia River this season. Work starts today on extending it further and the dredge Chinook will operate on the bar during the Summer.

One of the big wheat farms of the state was sold the past week when the lands of the J. A. Woolery estate, in Morrow county, passed to a syndicate of North Dakota bankers.

The purchase of a big tract of timber land on the Siuslaw River during the past week by Porter Bros., believed to represent J. J. Hill, strengthens the belief that

the east and west line across Oregon will be built.

The biggest shipment of spraying materials ever sent to any fruit district in Oregon was received during the past week at Medford, when 90,000 pounds of fruit pests in the Rogue River Valley.

The tax statement of Umatilla County for 1909 almost reaches the half a million mark. The county has no bonded indebtedness.

An Open River and Freight Rate convention will be held at Albany on April 14. It will be largely attended.

Work will soon be begun on the new Federal building at Pendleton, which will cost \$50,000. Only four votes were recorded against the proposed \$40,000 bond issue to erect a high school at Lakeview.

About a quarter million will be spent by the Coos Bay Gas & Electric company in new equipment and extensions.

A canal will be begun soon to drain and reclaim 19,000 acres in the Wood River Valley, Klamath County.

The O. R. & N. farming demonstration train that was run through Eastern Oregon and Washington, returning the past week, was the most successful ever operated in this state.

WILL COLONIZE LAND

Opening up of the immense holdings of the Willamette Valley & Cascade Mountains Military Road company to colonization by the Minnesota syndicate, which has become owner, is expected to result in extensive advertising of the state of Oregon.

The supposition is that the actual consummation of the transfer of the land will be followed by a rapid opening up of the vast stretches of virgin soil to settlers on attractive terms and that thousands upon thousands of homeseekers will pour into the state in response to flattering inducements.

That the Hill interests will be in the field to handle this immense traffic is taken for granted, and therefore the actual transfer of the land is considered identical to an announcement to the effect that Hill will stretch a line across the state from east to west.—Journal.
