PROMOTE POWER PROJECT.

Some of the stockholders of the Burns Flour Mill Co. went up to Emigrant creek the first of this week to investigate the power site owned by the company. They were accompanied by an experienced man in such projects and he was most favorably impressed with the possibilities. All are agreed that a great horse power can be generated on the property and it is likely the project will be put before the stockholders in the near future with the result that work will begin on the property soon.

The city authorities might anticipate this action and secure the necessary ground for a ceptic tank and otherwise provide for city water and sewerage, as this company can no doubt furnish power for such as well as lights and other purposes.

RIGHT ON THE JOB.

For the benefit of those who really want to know the statement is made that the county court is right on the job so far as any road or other matters that come up before it in proper manner are concerned. The present county court is doing all it possibly can toward the betterment of roads throughout Harney county. All available equipment is being used and road masters are doing good work. There is urgent demand for general repair work in every section as is always the case at this time of year and this must have attention to make the highways passable for heavy teaming.

The Burns-Bend road was never before the court on petition until the present term which convened Wednesday of this week. The court has been ready to act upon this road at any time but had to wait proper procedure. The court even exceeded its authority in order to expedite this road building by ordering it viewed and surveyed before the necessary petition was filed calling for such road. A portion of this proposed highway passes over private land and the court cannot without some authority open up such roads.

THE TIMES-HERALD REPRESENTED.

On Sunday, April 9, funeral services over the remains of Mr. McMillan were held.

On Monday, April 10, a check for \$5,000.00, the full amount of his policy in Oregon Life, was paid to the widow.

Mr. McMillan carried insurance in six other companies, and they undoubtedly in course of time paid the respective amounts due on their policies, but Oregon Life Insurance Company, as always, was FIRST to pay.
