THE TIMES-HERALD'S NEW BUILDING

The Times-Herald has let out a contract to Frank Swain and J. W. McGowan for a handsome two-story brick building to be erected on the corner of Main and B Streets. The contract calls for its completion by Sept. 15 and after that date the office will occupy its new quarters.

This will be one of the most substantial buildings in Burns and a credit to the city. The first floor will be office rooms entirely and the second floor will be devoted to hall purposes for the present until such time as there is demand for other purposes.

Delinquent subscribers may expect to receive a demand for remittance in the near future as a result of this building and other equipment contemplated in improving the facilities for the paper.

INDUSTRIAL NOTES.

(Portland Correspondence.) Good roads throughout Oregon is a subject that will in future receive a lot of attention from the Oregon Development League. Besides having a good road day at the Astoria convention, August 14, 15 and 16, the League will take up highway betterment actively and the officers of secretary Chapman of the League will be headquarters for the good roads movement.

Through its ramifications throughout the state, the League will learn public sentiment on the subject of good roads and strive to aid the various sections. Secretary Chapman of the League believes the subject touches very closely the welfare of the farmers. He hopes to bring together the various interests so they will work in harmony. First, he will learn the wishes of the people in the matter and do nothing not thoroughly representative of public opinion throughout the state.

There will be a large representation from the various Central Oregon commercial clubs at the convention in Prineville June 30-July 1, when the Central Oregon Development League will be formed. There is keen interest throughout that section and much is hoped from the projected organization, which will take up the problems that confront Central Oregon, a new country, yet in the making. It is considered important that right steps be taken and the new league will be of great benefit along these lines.

Salem's annual cherry fair has been set on the July 6, 7 and 8, and promises to be bigger and better than ever. Portland people are taking much interest in the event and a special excursion will be run from this city, taking prominent business men to the fair. Big parades will be features of the event.

Lake County will work as a whole in future for development. The former Lakeview Board of Trade has been dissolved and the Lake County Development League has taken its place. Thoroughly aroused to the benefits of united work, Lake County people may reasonably hope for results from the new organization.

Ashland will hold its annual Chautauqua Assembly July 6-18. The talent offered this year is of a high order and the forthcoming session will attract people from all parts of Southern Oregon.

Portland was visited by an Eastern flax expert the past week, who expressed surprise that more attention is not paid to this crop in Oregon. He praised the quality of the flax he found here as being superior to that found elsewhere, either in this country or abroad and hopes to see the day when a great linen industry will be built up and farmers generally throughout Western Oregon will grow flax with profit.

SPRAY YOUR ORCHARD.

EDITOR THE TIMES-HERALD:—Some days ago I received full instructions from the Secretary of State Board of Horticulture as to the duty of the fruit inspector. I have been examining many orchards for pests and find none free from aphid and codling moth. Second crop of latter will hatch out about 25th or 30th of present month here. Owners of all orchards where I find them will be notified with what and when to spray.

In many places I find locart in clouds and have been watching them closely but have not determined as yet whether they attack the aphid or the trees, but I am of the opinion that they are working on both. The codling moth is the worst and most destructive pest we have here, and the young larva cut off the bloom, and here in Harney county in particular frost has always to shoulder the blame.

Let all prepare to spray from

25th of present month until July 15th and they will thereby catch second hatch in proper season. I find Watkins Stock dip one (1) to twenty-eight (28) of water gets the aphid and locart.
