SITE SELECTED FOR FARM.

The main station of the Experiment Farm has been selected and embraces two hundred acres of land adjoining the Fred Densetad place six miles east of Burns. This was the first choice of the committee of regents sent here for this purpose and is a part of the land grant recently purchased by the Oregon and Western Colonization Co.

Judge Thompson wrote President Davidson of the company to put a price on the land and that gentleman showed his public spirit by leaving it to the court to determine the value, offering to give the tract for this purpose if necessary.

The court has asked that the man to take charge be selected at once by the Agricultural Board and sent here to superintend the construction of buildings and other improvements. This will be done at a meeting to be held this month.
