least four needles, these needles to be about one-eighth of an inch in length. The handle of the instrument is similar to that of a large rubber stamp. By simply turning back the upper lip, dipping the instrument in ink and quickly stamping the upper lip with the instrument, afterwards rubbing a little ink into the punctures, it insures a permanent brand.

The instrument used for marking horses of the army is more complicated than the one described, and will be patented. The object of patenting this instrument is not to derive revenue, but to prevent others from using it, and to enable the Government to retain control of the instrument until such time as legislation can be had to regulate its use. It is the desire of the War Department that no tattooing in the mouth shall be done without the approval of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. This is to prevent duplications of brands as well as to prevent private individuals from using the same system as the Government.

Opening Market for Grass Beef.

No advance agent of prosperity has heralded the approach of a summer run of fat grass beef from the trans-Missouri range this year and the absence of stereotype forecasts is significant. Usually the season is inaugurated by the arrival of a contestant of fat Wyoming or Montana steers that warrants the use of the camera and headlines in the market papers. This season opened inauspiciously with the arrival of a few lots of bovine refugees from the scorched pastures of Montana and South Dakota, mostly little stuff unfrequented with beef and having no place at the market. That they would not have been there had grazing conditions permitted holding is obvious. Shipping calves, heifers and cows in July off the range tells the story of hardship eloquently. The blow dealt at the cattle breeding industry in the West last year is being repeated and the "nester" is discouraged. Early arrivals from the Northwest included 18 cars of young stuff gathered in the northwest corner of South Dakota that only realized around \$20 per head in Chicago, a feeder paying \$3.75. A year ago, on a somewhat higher feeder market they realized \$5.10. The season opened with a run of little cattle of excellent quality but thin as rails, and composition of the consignments indicated that everything had been gathered.

Naturally packers are not looking for much fat grass steers from the Northwest this year. There will be some, but not in old time abundance. So far as grass and humidity are concerned the cattle country embracing the Dakotas, Montana and Wyoming is as spotted as the cornbelt. Trade scouts tell of sections that have had no rain for two years; of others where feed is fairly plentiful and stock water not yet exhausted, but over large areas neither food nor water exists, and where old grass is to be had cattle cannot utilize it owing to water shortage.

The western cattle market for the next four months will be inconspicuous. Movement of animals may not be so brisk as in a numerical sense, but it will be deficient in quality. It is evident, and this fact ought to exert a bullish influence on the value of what the cornbelt will send to market. Breeder's Gazette.
