mainline into San Francisco.

From Lakeview, in the southern part of the state the Hills will sweep eastward through the Malheur Valley on to Boise. Thence the route of the Pacific & Idaho Northern will be followed as far as Lardo, a point on Big Payette Lake, then east up Payette Creek, through the Sawtooth range, down Luck Creek to the South Fork of Salmon River, up the East Fork of the South Fork of Salmon River to Profile Gap. Down the Big Auk to Middle Fork, to the main Salmon River, up the Salmon River on the survey of the Pittsburg & Gilmore to Salmon City and then across Montana to Logan City on the Northern Pacific.

Several crews of Hill surveyors have been at work for months in the Idaho country and are running lines over the most important section of this general route. It is well-known that the Harriman interests already own the Idaho Northern, the so-called "Dewey Road," and they have already let a contract to the Utah Construction Company for construction of a line from Boise up to Smith's Ferry and will build to Payette Lake within the next year or 15 months. The principal purpose in the Harriman mind and in doing this to keep Hill out of Boise, but, according to The Telegram's informant, Hill has as good as an even race if not a little advantage in the contest for the reason that the Hill line will have a more direct route with easier grades.
