Secretary Mothershead yesterday received by wire the following which is a copy of a message from L. W. Hill in response to an urgent invitation from Bill Hanley and C. C. Chapman to attend the Development meeting in Burns:

"Many thanks for your kind message. Have mailed our itinerary. Will probably have evening meeting at Prineville Oct. 1; all day at Burns the 3rd, spend night of the 4th at Prineville and arrive at Bend noon the 5th, remain two hours and have a sight drive right after lunch. James J. Hill would like to see more of Central Oregon, but have not an hour to spare on the schedule as must be in Springfield 10th.

Mr. Chapman wires that the Hill party includes several prominent eastern capitalists and that a procession of automobiles from Portland, Madras, Metolius, Cul-

ver, Prineville, Redmond and Bend will escort the Party to and from Burns, making historic cavalcade which is heralded by the American press as the most picturesque and important event ever held in western railroad history.
