The Longfellow group of the Ladies Afternoon Club held an open session last night at the home of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Gault.

The program was rendered as follows and was in two parts, consisting of music and readings based upon the works of America's grand old author.

The first section was opened with a piano solo by Mr. James Fellows which was greatly appreciated; "Longfellow's life as told in his poems," by Mrs. J. W. Geary, followed and was illustrated in song by the hostess in her usual delightful manner.

The second section was conducted by Mrs. John C. Foley, reading from the author's work, "Miles Standish" being illustrated in a well acted miniature pantomime, by Miss Agnes Foley and Masters Woodbridge Geary and Charles Foley.

Mr. Platt Randall rendered one of his fine baritone solos. The closing number was a reading of Longfellow's poem, "The Day is Done," by Mrs. John C. Foley; the rendition was in a manner as to do justice to the author and call forth the highest praise for the reader.

A PIONEER CALLED.

Mrs. Julia Hudspeath, aged 77 years, died at the home of her son, Wm. Hudspeath, near Sumpter, last Friday night, Nov. 24. Mrs. Hudspeath was ill but a few hours the direct cause of her death was rheumatism which attacked her suddenly and went to her heart. The remains were brought here for burial the services being held Thursday afternoon at the cemetery by Rev. Father Roman. Her sons, William of Sumpter, and Thomas of Prairie, accompanied the remains over.

It was a severe shock to her children and the many warm friends of the family in this section where Mrs. Hudspeath had lived for so many years.

Only a few weeks ago her son Will had brought the remains of his father over from Sumpter and placed it in the family lot in the Burns cemetery, having taken the body from its temporary grave there in compliance with a request of the father before his death.

Decensed was born in Ireland and was married in Independence, Missouri on Nov. 5, 1855 and the family came to Harney Valley in 1885 where she had since resided up to two years ago when she and her late husband went to live with their son Will at Sumpter. She is survived by three sons and two daughters, Robt. N., of this city, Thos. H. of Prairie City, William G. of Sumpter; Mrs. Julia Hindman, of Baker, and Mrs. Sarah A. Zievers of Lewiston, Idaho.

The boys found many old time friends here to sympathize with them in their bereavement.
