**SUGGESTIONS FOR FUMIGATING.**  
 At the suggestion of Mr. Julian Byrd and others these few lines in regard to fumigation and disinfection following scarlet fever are made.  
 In a case of this kind a large airy room without carpets or superfluous curtains is to be desired.  
 After recovery—which will be in from 3 to 6 weeks usually but may be longer—everything used by the patient, that is washable should be washed. Some antiseptic like Formalin may be added to the first water with advantage. The floor and woodwork of the room should then be thoroughly swept and all dust and waste of every kind removed. Snow thrown upon the floor and thoroughly swept up will assist in removing dust.  
 The bedding and other articles that cannot be washed should be placed on chairs or temporary scaffolding and after stopping all cracks formaldehyde candles, 1 to each 1000 cubic feet should be burned and the fumes confined to the room for several hours.  
 When there are carpets, rugs, etc., the Vacuum Cleaner does excellent work. Premature fumigation or fumigations without previously cleaning a room of dust and dirt is useless. Books etc. are difficult to disinfect.
