#### CIRCUIT COURT WORK.

Considerable business was disposed of in Court during the week before adjourning Thursday evening. Disposition of the following cases since our last issue is noted:

#### LAW.

Sophia Tucker vs. M. L. Lewis. Attachment—Default and judgment by consent of defendant's attorney in open court.  
Clay Clemens vs. Fred Racine—Attachment. Passed until July 18.

#### EQUITY.

Chris Lackman vs. Christina Lackman—Quiet title. Referred to M. L. Blott to report testimony.  
R. L. Gillispie vs. C. H. Robertson—Specific performance. Findings and decree for plaintiff.

C. C. Lundy vs. Corda Lundy—Divorce. Findings and decree for defendant. Custody of child awarded to Mrs. Cecil and alimony, \$1000, \$15.00 per month for care of child.

J. W. Shown vs. Joseph Clark and Oregon & Western Colonization Co.—Injunction continued for the term by consent.

Carrie Hanks vs. Asher Hanks—Divorce. Findings and decree for plaintiff.

James Snodgrass vs. Van S. Curtis. Referred to official reporter.

Martha Sagers vs. Thos. Sagers—Divorce. Referred to official reporter.

Jay Jenkins vs. S. F. Jenkins—Injunction. Findings and decree for plaintiff. No costs to either party.

#### CRIMINAL.

State vs. Jesse Marshall—Assault and robbery. Jury brought in a verdict of assault being armed with a dangerous weapon. Sentenced indeterminate, six months to ten years.

J. M. Taylor who was convicted of murder in first degree was sentenced to be executed on May 31.

State vs. Arthur and Harry Spangler—Larceny of a mare. Jury brought in a verdict of guilty and recommended mercy. Sentenced one to ten years and paroled by the court.

State vs. John Osborn—Assault with intent to kill. Placed under \$1000 bond to appear at adjourned term July 18.  
Court adjourned Thursday evening to re-convene at an adjourned term set for July 18. Judge Biggs left yesterday for Vale where he opens a term of court on next Monday.

A new grand jury was drawn and did some work, bringing in an indictment against John Osborn for cutting Scott. He gave

bonds for his appearance in July. The members of the new Grand Jury are: Sam Mothershead, foreman; C. H. Davis, L. C. Bradford, C. S. Johnson, John Wintermeier, Fred Denstedt, A. S. Swain.

The men convicted on criminal charges were started for the penitentiary Thursday afternoon in charge of Geo. S. Sizemore, Thos. Howser and James Crawford.

#### THE GRIM REAPER.

DIED—Near Alberson on April 2, of pneumonia, Gumasindo Bermudis, aged 68 years. His wife Caroline, died on April 9 from cancer of the stomach. She was 75 years old. The old Spaniard and his wife had resided in that section for many years. Dr. Geary went out to see the old lady and was at the home at the time of her death.

Daniel Hanley died at the county hospital last Saturday afternoon from pneumonia, aged 50 years. Deceased came here several years ago at the time of the erection of the Harney County National Bank and had yet been a resident of this place working at his trade as a stone cutter. He was ill but a few days. He leaves a widow here, but we do not know whether he had other relatives or not. Interment was made in the Burns cemetery Sunday.

Chasteen Salisbury, the eight-months old son of Mr. and Mrs. C. M. Salisbury, died at the fami-

ly home in this city Tuesday, April 9. The little one had been very ill for several days and his death was not unexpected. The funeral service was conducted by Rev. C. W. Holloman at the home Wednesday afternoon. The bereaved mother was prostrated at the loss and too ill to accompany the little body to the cemetery later. She is much better now. They have the sympathy of a wide circle of friends.

John Hoffeditz, the seven-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. M. J. Hoffeditz, died at the family home in Valley View on Thursday, April 11, from the effects of scarlet fever. Interment was made near the Valley View school house. John was a bright little fellow and idolized by his parents. It was a sad death indeed and the bereaved parents and sister have the heartfelt sympathy of many friends.

Samuel F. Hutton, the highly respected old pioneer, died at his home at Wagonire Thursday afternoon after an illness of several weeks. The body was brought to this city and the funeral service will be held this afternoon at the Presbyterian church Rev. Dr. Babbidge conducting the service.

Mr. Hutton was born in Perry county, Ohio, July 25, 1843. Was married in that state in 1865 and with his family came to Jackson county in 1878, moving in 1884 to Wagonire Mountain in this county where they had since resided. By hard work Mr. Hutton accumulated a considerable fortune and his sons wanted him to enjoy it but the sturdy old man was content and happy on his big ranch and remained there until his death. He is survived by his wife and three children, Lincoln and Thomas, the two sons live near the family home, and his daughter, Mrs. Isaac Foster, resides on Silver Creek. He is also survived by one brother, James, who resides in Colorado, a sister Mrs. Longfellow, of Medford and another sister, Mrs. Bell in Colorado.

William T. Smith passed away yesterday, April 12 after an illness of some ten days. He contracted pneumonia. Mr. Smith was 67 years old and had resided here about 7 years. He engaged in real estate business, was an auctioneer and also was agent for gasoline engines. He had no relatives in this section but his widow and a large family of children survive him in Oklahoma. The funeral had been arranged for tomorrow afternoon but later a telegram was received

from his daughter in Oklahoma that she was coming and the body will be held until she reaches here.

Mrs. A. O. Faulkner died suddenly at her home in this city Thursday evening, the cause of death being thrombosis of the pulmonary artery. The lady had been feeling well all day and had remarked on how well she felt. Her nurse was making preparations for Mrs. Faulkner to retire when she suddenly said it was hard to get her breath. The nurse thought she had merely fainted but telephoned for her physician and the estimable lady expired almost immediately. A little daughter was born to Mr. and Mrs. Faulkner on March 25th and the mother had been gaining rapidly, the sudden death coming most unexpectedly. Dr. Marsden states such cases are very rare.

It was a terrible shock to the husband and hundreds of warm friends when her death was announced. Funeral arrangements have not been made as both the mothers of Mr. and Mrs. Faulkner are en route from their homes in the east and their arrival is indefinite. The services will be held sometime the latter part of the coming week.

Mrs. Faulkner was born in Van Wert, Ohio, April 9, 1882 and was married to Mr. Faulkner on July 14, 1909 coming to Burns soon after where she has since made her home. She soon made many friends among her associates in Burns and her home was made cheerful by her amiable disposition. She was most highly esteemed by a wide circle of friends who mourn with the bereaved husband her untimely death.
