### Silvies River Farmers Union.

An organization of farmers in this vicinity has been formed and officered by substantial farmers that will be of a great deal of benefit not only to the organization but to the community as well. The Silvies River Farmers Union is the name adopted and from the manner they are starting off they will be factors in many respects.

Frank Jackson, secretary-treasurer of the organization informs The Times-Herald that it has already proven a mutual benefit to the members and it has hardly been organized. For instance, it was found by a canvass of only a portion of the membership that they would need at least 4000 lbs of binding twine and by placing an order for such an amount it was secured at a much less price than by individuals buying separately. Another saving will be in the purchase of sacks. Mr. Jackson states that he has made a canvass and finds that more than 6000 sacks will be required to take care of the coming grain crops and by placing such an order he finds they can save almost half what they would cost individuals.

Mr. Jackson explains that the organization is not framed to fight in any respect, but merely a mutual benefit and protection of its members. That no one is bound to abide by the actions of the organization so far as their individual affairs or inclinations are concerned and that it is the purpose to work in harmony with the business men and commercial interests of this section to the mutual advancement of all.

An inspection of the membership roster and the officers convinces one of the permanency of the organization and that it is one that will be a credit to the community.

## BUSINESS MEN OF BURNS ENTERTAIN

C. B. Merrick, Postmaster of Portland and N. A. Perry, President of the Oregon Retail Merchants' Association are Guests of Honor

The Business Men's Club of this city gave a delightful banquet last night at the Masonic hall, the occasion being the visit of C. B. Merrick, postmaster of Portland, and formerly secretary of the Oregon Retail Merchants' Association, and N. A. Perry, president of that organization. The gentlemen arrived late last evening making the trip in Mr. Perry's car.

These gentlemen are out on a tour of the state in the interest of the organization, lending encouragement to the clubs and urging organization where none have existed and are helping very materially in bringing about better conditions and a closer harmony among the men thus engaged in business. While Mr. Merrick is not now actively engaged in business, his former association and active interest still holds him and he is making this tour as a vacation to meet former associates and friends. The gentlemen will leave here tomorrow for Lakeview where they will attend the development congress and from that point will go to Klamath and Crater Lake before returning to Portland.

A large number of the merchants of this city with their wives and clerks, President Miller of the Commercial Club and the newspaper men met the visitors at the banquet board and after the repeat several good talks were made. Judge Miller in welcoming the guests reviewed conditions here from his personal knowledge of some 30 years, telling of the methods of merchants of the early days and what improvements had been made by the more modern way of doing business. He spoke of the hospitality of the people of this section and how it had always existed; of the sociability of the city of Burns and the interest taken in guests and strangers within our gates. Mayor Clevenger followed Judge Miller with a few remarks.

J. M. Dalton was called upon by Toast Master Geer to tell something of the organization of the Business Mens Club in Burns and its objects. Mr. Dalton said the real cause of the organization, or rather the motive for it, was the deadbeat. He explained how people who would not pay their bills had caused considerable loss to the merchants of this section, especially as the merchants of this city had been in the habit of extending almost unlimited credit; and that the particular object of the organization and how a better understanding among the business men proved of mutual benefit not only to the members but the general public as well. It is not an organization to raise prices or form a trust, but more for the social and betterment of conditions in general.

N. A. Perry, president of the state organization was next introduced and spoke briefly of the benefits of the clubs and urged early closing so that the merchant and his help might enjoy the privilege of their homes and social intercourse with their friends and patrons. He was followed with an excellent talk by Hon. Frank Davey, who expressed the approval of such an organization from the standpoint of a newspaper man and commended the object. Mr. Davey also spoke his approval of the stopping of waste from the dead beat as well as the waste of time in keeping late hours by the merchants.

Mr. Merrick gave an exceptionally interesting talk on what had been accomplished by the state organization and the beneficial legislation secured through their efforts. He named particularly the pure food law, peddlers' license law, and others. He was proud to announce that the suggestion of the peddlers law was made by the business men of Burns and the first contributions received to further such legislation came from Burns merchants. Mr. Merrick expressed his warm appreciation of the manner they had been received by the business men of this city and also a desire to see more of the big Harney Valley for which he had been a booster for several years but which he had never seen. He said he felt that he was going to get caught some day in some of his yarns about this big territory, therefore he considered it best to see it and be on his guard.

Among others who spoke briefly were Julian Byrd, A. K. Richardson, H. J. Hansen and Mrs. Wm. Miller, the latter spoke as a member of the Womens Civic League and expressed their appreciation of the Business Mens Club donating their club rooms to that organization for reading rooms.

There was a decided sentiment among those present for early closing of the stores of this city and no doubt the Club will come to an understanding on this matter at an early date and the stores will close at an early hour. Mr. Merrick and Mr. Perry are spending the day calling on the merchants and seeing a portion of the country.

## A Good Example to Follow.

J. H. Eichner was in the city this week and yesterday called at this office to pay his respects and incidentally his subscription to this great religious weekly which is necessary to all well regulated households in this county.

Mr. Eichner states he has a fine garden and one of the best crops he has raised for years in his fields. He also has 115 hens that are making a record for themselves besides helping materially in a financial way.

Mr. Eichner informs us that he has caught 1570 jack rabbits in steel traps on his 100 acre clearing since last February. He would have caught more but his harvesting has interfered lately. Now if all his neighbors had done as much there would have been a good many less rabbits to eat up the grain crops. He states the rabbits were not "wasted" as he fed them to his chickens, and is sure they increased the egg production to a considerable extent.
