### Will Engage In Dairying And General Stock Raising

J. R. Robinson of Coeur D'Alene, Idaho, left here Tuesday after looking over a considerable portion of the country. He went directly to Portland where he closed a deal for the purchase of a section of land with President Davidson of the Oregon & Western Colonization Co. The section bought is on Prather creek just across the road from the Cowing place and is an excellent piece of fine agricultural land. Mr. Robinson stated when here he was all ready to move to a new location as soon as he found what he wanted, therefore he is expected back at once to begin active work in improving his new possessions. He intends to engage in the dairy and general stock raising business.
