In harness races purses divided 50 per cent to first horse 25 to second, 15 to third and 10 to fourth. Entries to races close at 8 o'clock on the evening preceding the race. The Association reserves the right to hold a less number than five to fill a race by reducing the purse in proportion to the number of horses entered. Entrance fee 10 per cent of purse. Saddle races without fee. No entrance fee charged in bronco busting, steer tying, bulldogging and wild horse races. Purse divided 70 per cent to first and 30 per cent to second. Harness races governed by American Trotting Association Rules. Running races governed by Pacific Coast Jockey Club Rules. The Association reserves the right to change, alter, postpone or declare off any and all races for a good and sufficient cause. Should above races not fill properly, they will be changed to suit horses in attendance.
