Rather an unique article entitled "If Advertising Were Eliminated" is published in the Woman's Home Companion. It is worth some study and should prove interesting to the advertiser. It is as follows:

Can you imagine what existence would be like if all advertising were eliminated? It would mean more than the absence of advertising in the pages of the periodicals and newspapers. It would mean that the grocer would not have the name of his business printed over his door or on his window. The drug stores would not display the globes of colored water. The minister would not announce the topic of his next sermon, nor the midweek meetings, from the pulpit. There wouldn't be even sign posts at the country crossroads nor on the street corners in towns and cities.

If you visit a strange community where there was no advertising whatever, you would realize how absolutely dependent you are upon advertising. If you wanted to go to a store particularly the best store, no one could direct you, for that is advertising—word-of-mouth advertising, which is sometimes as important and as valuable as any other. Frankly, you would find it practically impossible to live without advertising, although you might manage to exist after a fashion.

A mere child could tangle us up in about a minute if his insatiable curiosity were directed to advertising. To his first question we could promptly and truthfully reply that a man advertises to make money. "How does he make money by advertising?" the answer isn't so easy. Possibly the childish mind might be satisfied with the explanation that advertising increases the volume of business, which is true of course, but it is neither comprehensive nor final.

You may follow it through ever so many ramifications, and in the end you will find that advertising pays for the simple reason that it renders a service to you and me and to the man and woman next door.

AGRICULTURAL SHORT COURSE AT HOME

County Board Wishes an Expression From Those Interested and Will Attend—Write to Mr. Breithaupt

The county board has asked The Times-Herald to ascertain what the farmers of this county think of the proposed "Short Course" in agriculture, stock raising, domestic science, etc., to be held in this city during February. It is the intention of the board to secure instructors from the Agricultural College to bring all the advantages of the short course lectures as conducted each year at the college right to the farmers of Harney county provided there is sufficient interest shown to justify the venture. Every advantage given at the college may be secured right here at home if the farmers will give the matter their attention and interest.

The plan is to hold sessions for at least two weeks and longer if attendance and results justify. This is the only time of the year when the instructors from the college are available and is the right time for the farmer to take advantage of them. Remember it is up to the farmer. If he does not signify his interest and intention of attending it will be a waste of time and expense to secure the instructors who can put in the time to good advantage at points where interest is shown.

The Times-Herald understands this course of lectures will cover every feature or problem involved in this section and are bound to be of momentous benefit to those who attend them. These instructors are practical men who have had experience and will give the best instructions along the lines they are making a specialty of. The domestic science class will also be of much benefit to the ladies and the farmer should arrange to bring his wife and daughters too.

Those who will attend are requested to fill in the coupon printed in this issue of The Times-Herald and mail it to L. R. Breithaupt, Superintendent Experiment Station, Burns, Oregon. These should be sent him at the earliest possible moment as it is necessary that the board know the number who will attend by the first part of next month in order to make necessary arrangements, secure the instructors and finance the course.

Another matter that enters into the arrangements is accommodations for those desiring to attend.

turns himself and he attributes his defeat to bad weather, the vote in those precincts was very light owing to the bad storm and muddy roads. A large number of sheep men were prevented from going to the polls.

This morning reports are some what changed from those received earlier. Lane is 1000 in the lead for U. S. Senator and Jim Mahon has a chance for election as he is reported only 40 behind in Malheur and in 14 precincts in this county has a lead of 197 while Stewart is credited with carrying Grant by about 250. Mahon will gain many votes in this county and possibly will be elected. It is also reported that suffrage has carried in the state.

Outside of Burns very little is known respecting the vote on the various measures. The court house is defeated. According to outside reports abolishment of capital punishment has lost; single tax, the various road bills and abolishing state senate have apparently all lost.

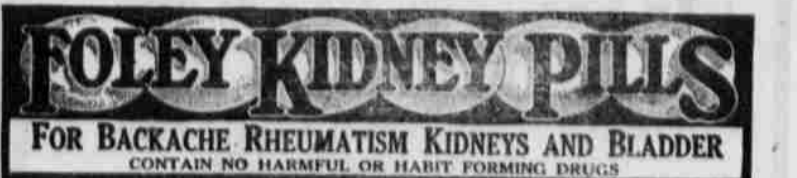
