To Parents and Patrons:—It is a matter of much regret that the records show so many cases of tardiness for the month just closed, yet such is the case. Forty-five pupils, with a grand total of sixty-one cases and a probable loss of ten minutes to each pupil is too much for a school like the one in Burns.

Punctuality is just as essential as other subjects taught and the sooner the boys and girls of Burns acquire the habit the sooner such records as the above will cease to be.

The co-operation of all patrons and parents is respectfully requested that this habit of tardiness may be cured. Last year there were 899 cases of tardiness recorded far, far too many.

A system of home credits will probably be placed in operation very soon and the help of parents and others interested in the boys and girls of Burns will be needed to make it a success, for the school board and the teachers are only a small factor in preparing these young people for good citizenship.
