AGRICULTURAL SHORT COURSE FEB. 24, MAR. 1

The First County Farmers' Short Course Ever Conducted in Oregon Given in Burns Under Auspices of High School At Tonawama Theatre.

A telegram from Prof. H. D. Scudder of the Agricultural College received Wednesday by Supt. Breithaupt of the Experiment Farm announces the definite date of the short course Feb. 24th to March 1st. Three instructors are coming from the college to conduct the course and they will be assisted by J. C. Leedy, instructor in agriculture in high school, and L. R. Breithaupt of the Experiment Farm.

The instructors are: Prof. H. D. Scudder, head of the Agronomy Department, will conduct the work in crops, soil, etc. Prof. E. L. Potter, head of the Department of Animal Husbandry, will conduct the work in stock judging, study of breeds, types of farm animals, etc. Mrs. Calvin, Dean of the School of Domestic Science and Art, will conduct the work in domestic science. She will be assisted by Miss Irwin of the high school. These people, who are the best the college affords, are coming here to work for the benefit of those who are fortunate enough to be able to attend this short course. The course is free to the people of Harney county, in every way, and there will be no charges for entrance.

The sessions are to be held in Tonawama as it has been found the attendance will be larger than any one room in the high school building will accommodate. Each session will begin at eight o'clock in the morning, but it is hoped to so arrange the programs that those in the vicinity of Burns may take advantage of particular work and still be able to go and come from their homes and take care of their chores on the farm. There may be one or more evening lectures with illustrations, as Tonawama management has kindly consented to use its light plant and stereopticon for such purposes should it be required.
While it is assured there is going to be a large attendance it is being given as wide publicity as possible and more are invited. The people of Burns are taking an active interest in the short course and will open their homes to those who come in for that purpose, and together with the capacity of the hotels of this place people are assured of being properly housed and taken care of. In addition to this Bill Hanley has wired from Portland that the "Bell A" ranch will be prepared to take care of 50 "short courses" free of charge. The ladies should remember the domestic science course is for their particular benefit and they are expected to take advantage of it and be out in numbers. This being the first short course ever given in Oregon away from the agricultural college it should be given every attention by the people of this section who reap the benefit. It is going to result in vast good to the people who take advantage of it.
Mr. Breithaupt left yesterday for a tour of the Waverly, Harriman, Lawen, Narrows and Sunset districts to call the attention of the farmers to the importance of the course and Burns is going to be prepared to take care of all who come.

PREDICTS STRENUOUS SEASON IN REAL ESTATE

President Davidson of the Oregon & Western Colonization Co. Visits Burns, Accompanied by Geo. M. Bailey, Townsite Man.

W. P. Davidson, president of the Oregon & Western Colonization Co., arrived here Thursday night, coming by way of Prineville. With him was Geo. M. Bailey of the Northwest Townsite Co., and also the promoter of the Carey act over in the Paisley country. Mr. Bailey has been here before and his company purchased an addition to Burns on the west which has all been disposed of. He has headquarters in Portland at present and is directing his efforts toward the irrigation project at Paisley and also preparing to start a National bank in that town. He has had much experience in promoting townsites and other enterprises and is thoroughly convinced the Carey act will yet prove a great benefit to this state when properly handled by competent people. Mr. Bailey does not consider the government reclamation service is conducted along right lines and is outspoken in his condemnation of the methods and incompetency shown. The Times-Herald has said as much in the past and sees no reason to change its opinion. A visit to irrigation projects in Idaho a few years ago convinced the writer that private enterprise was of much greater importance and gets quicker results than the government projects. It was plainly demonstrated on the Mindoka and Twin Falls projects. The reclamation work of the government has invariably been underestimated and the settlers disappointed not only in respect to the price but also as to delays in getting water. Another matter which Mr. Bailey calls attention to is the fact that the government doesn't advertise the possibilities and terms of such lands, but allows thousands of our people to be coaxed into Canada each year by proper methods of advertising.

Mr. Davidson states that Prof. Thos. Shaw of the Great North-ern is going to start a demonstration dry farm over in Crook county this year. The company would equip a farm here to be under the care of this well known expert were it possible for him to make frequent trips in to look after it, but this section will have to await transportation lines.
Mr. Davidson expects great activity in this section as soon as spring opens in the way of real estate transfers. There is a general movement toward this section and the spring will witness a large influx of people. His company is now investigating the proposition of possible transportation in on the Oregon & Eastern now building west from Vale, to ascertain how far trains will be run during the next few months. If they can secure assurance of rail transportation in as far as Juntura even twice a week, it is their intention to operate automobiles from that point and working from that end of the line in bringing people to see their lands.
B. F. Johnson, the local agent of the company was with Mr. Davidson and the party went out to Harriman yesterday with the intention of returning as far as
