#### SUITS FOR RIGHT OF WAY.

Papers were filed last Tuesday by G. A. Rembold as the local attorney representing the O. W. R. & N. Co. for rights of way through Harney county indicate that the rumors to the effect that a new survey of the railroad was being made south of the line, leading out from Malheur gap are a mistake. The suits are against C. A. Spurlock et al, F. C. Flister and Fred Otley et al, are to condemn and settle the cost of damage and value of the land necessary for the rail line through the respective places. The tract affected in the suit against Mr. Otley is south of Laven and along the original survey of the line, it is taken for granted the line will follow this route.

Parties just in from Vale state that the work in the big tunnel is progressing very slowly at present and all other work has ceased awaiting the completion of the big bore. However, it is considered that with this completed work west from that point will progress very rapidly and the summer will witness great haste and actual completion of the line into Harney Valley.

Another question respecting the western connection of the line has also been practically settled according to authority and

this is that the line will connect at Odel and not at Bend.

timber in the eastern part of Linn county on the west slope of the Cascades, where the Siam river and all of its many tributaries have their source.

The land carries about 5,250,000,000 feet of timber, cruising 4,900,000,000 feet of fir, 108,000,000 feet of larch, 182,000 feet of hemlock, 24,000,000 feet of cedar, 12,000,000 feet of white pine and 4,500,000 feet of spruce.

The land was a part of the large military road grant lands in central Oregon purchased about two years ago by the Oregon & Western Colonization company from the syndicate of French owners which had held them for a number of years for a rise in values. The purchase price for the entire grant was about \$8,000,000 and it is stated that the transfer of the timber on the west slope involves a consideration of \$4,000,000. Included in the holdings retained by the company are about 160,000 acres on the east slope of the Cascades, carrying a heavy stand of yellow pine, some white pine, white fir and tamarack, cruising very close to 1,000,000,000 feet.
