He said he did not expect much money from his wool clip this season as the sheep men were the victims of circumstances and the combination of wool buyers had them in such a position that they must take their medicine. He knows the tariff bug-a-boo has nothing to do with the low price offered but it must be put up with this season. Be next season, however, things will be adjusted and the wool business resume its normal condition. Mr. Jenkins has kept advised on the wool market of the world and knows that both wool and pelts are selling for more money in foreign countries than here and he further says that when the Panama Canal is completed and we have transportation in Harney county that local wool growers can compete with the world and make money as it can be produced as cheaply in Harney county as anywhere—and a good staple too. He suggests cutting out the buyer and commission man altogether and shipping direct.
