Notice is hereby given:

1. That unless within eight days from the completion of the publication of this notice as hereinafter mentioned, the owner or owners of two-thirds of the property adjacent to and abutting on the streets and parts of streets hereinafter named and the improvement to be made thereon, shall make and file with the Recorder of the City of Burns a written remonstrance against the proposed improvement mentioned herein, the same will be proceeded with and made in accordance with the provisions of the Charter of said city authorizing such improvement.

2. That the following streets and parts of streets on which the grades have been established by ordinance No. 143 for said city, as follows, to-wit: Beginning at the corporate limits of said city on the street running east and west on the south side of block K in Second Addition to Burns, and running thence west on said street to Fifth street; thence north on Fifth street to Monroe street; thence south on Monroe street to Miller avenue; thence south on Miller avenue to South street; thence west on South street to the west side of Hudson street, shall be improved as hereinafter mentioned.

3. That the kind of improvement to be made on said streets and parts of streets shall be as follows: all the streets and parts of streets herein mentioned and for which said improvement is proposed and for which grades have been established by ordinance No. 143, shall be graded to eight inches below said established grades by excavating where necessary, and by filling in where necessary, with dirt or other suitable material acceptable to the council, and then planing thereon, eight inches of a good quality of gravel, properly spread and smoothed in a good and workmanlike manner, so as to bring the surface of said streets up to the established grade, and the width on said streets to be so improved shall be all thereof between the curbs as established by said ordinance No. 143.

4. That the intersections of all streets included in the improvement herein mentioned shall be improved at the cost and expense of the City and paid for out of the general fund.

5. That the full cost and expense of making such improvement upon the half of the street in front of and abutting upon each lot or parcel thereof within the limits of such improvement shall be assessed against said lots or parts of lots abutting thereon, which shall be liable therefore, and the city shall acquire liens on said lots for the same.

6.
