A movement is on foot to cut off the Drewsey section of Harney county and take it into the proposed new county of Davis. An examination of the county records reveals the fact that the section to be cut off pays about one-twentieth of the taxes.

About one-seventh of the running expenses of the county are expended in that section. As a matter of dollars and cents it would pay Harney county tax payers to allow them to secede.

It is a great inconvenience for the residents of the Drewsey section to come to Burns for county seat purposes and if they desire to set up a county organization and handle the same, they should be allowed to do so. In justice to the residents of Drewsey and as a matter of saving Harney county tax payer several thousand dollars a year in running expenses.
