### WAR TAX!

The public's attention is respectfully directed to the following important provisions of the new War Revenue Bill, effective December 1st, 1914.

NOTES. Notes must bear stamps when not exceeding \$100.00, two cents; for each additional \$100.00 or fractional part thereof in excess of \$100.00, two cents.

DEEDS. When the consideration or value of the interest or property conveyed, exclusive of the value of any lien or encumbrance thereon, exceeds \$100.00 and does not exceed \$500.00, 50 cents; and for each additional \$500,00 or fractional part thereof in excess of \$500, 50 cents.

MORTGAGES. Mortgages given to secure the payment of promissory notes are exempt, but the notes which such mortgages secure must bear the required amount of stamps.


