NATHAN BROWN.

Pioneer Merchant of Burns Died at San Francisco April 26.

Universal grief was expressed by the entire citizenry of Burns upon receipt of a telegram announcing the death of N. Brown at his home in San Francisco on April 26. He had been seriously ill for almost two weeks and his sons, Ben and Leon, were summoned to his bedside.

The writer had known Mr. Brown intimately for 30 years and feels a personal loss in his passing. His long residence here and intimate association with the development of this big country brought him the admiration and warm friendship of a wide circle extending to and beyond the borders of Harney county. His confidence in the future of Burns and surrounding country made it possible for him to make judicious investments and his faith inspired others to greater efforts in advancement.

Every business house in Burns was closed yesterday from 10 o'clock until 1 o'clock in respect for this esteemed pioneer.

Mr. Brown was born in Germany in January, 1835, but came to America when he was 13 years old. He came to San Francisco in 1852 but later engaged in business at Oregon City, then in Walla Walla, coming to Burns in 1884 and establishing a general merchandise store in which his sons, Ben and Leon, were associated. The volume of business of N. Brown & Sons has grown until now the activities of the firm cover a wide range of industries. Mr. Brown retired from active connection with the firm several years ago and had been making his home in San Francisco. He is survived by his wife and one daughter, both of whom reside in San Francisco, and two sons, Ben and Leon, of this city.

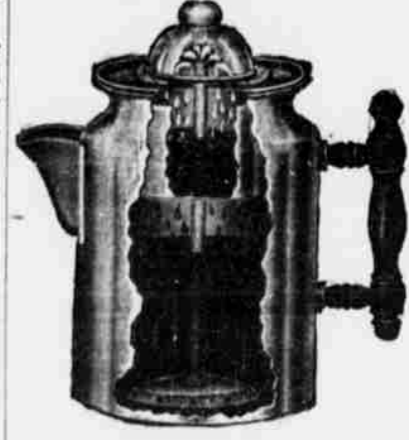
