To Settle a Dispute.

The following clipping from the Portland Journal was handed The Times-Herald with a request to publish:

The R. F. D. mail carrier has ordered a mail post put within four feet of the center of the main traveled road.

Should an accident occur on account of mail post placed there who would be held responsible—the property-holder, the county or the government?—A Subscriber.

It is a common rule of law, as well as common sense, that the one who places a post in a position to obstruct traffic or causes damage would be liable for any injuries that might arise from the act. It may be doubted that any rural mail carrier would have the authority or intent to cause a post to be placed where it would interfere with travelers over the road. The government cannot be sued for damages. The court of claims would pass on any just claims against the government, however, but it is only by act of congress that such claims are paid.

The Scientific American says that if one fly lays one of the six installments of 120 eggs of which it is capable that by September it would have a progeny numbering septillions. In figures by September 18 the number of flies resulting from the first batch of 120 eggs would be 26,297,705, 600,000,000,000 which in turn would lay 4,353,564,672,000,000, 000,000 eggs. Volcanoes and Diseases.

Many strange and exaggerated accounts have been given of terrible diseases in human beings, lower animals and plants as a result of volcanic activity. In a paper read by Dr. H. J. Johnston-Lavis it is shown that there is no direct connection with disease, but that volcanic outbursts may indirectly cause or increase epidemic disease in several ways. The poisonous fumes may have irritating and depressing effects on the eyes and throat. The disturbance of water courses may bring about the infection of wells and surface supplies with sewage, and interference with ventilation of houses may result from the accumulation of ejected materials. The moral depression from fear, with hunger from the cutting off of food supplies, may have the effect of lessening the resistance of the organization to infection.—Exchange.
