desiring a speedy adjudication of the rights of the Silvio River water and of the dilatory manner in which the State Board is proceeding. He spoke of the great necessity of bringing this matter to a close in order that the development of the country may go ahead.

Mr. Leonard was asked to say a few words but simply responded by saying the people of this vicinity were glad Mr. Strahorn had come to us in person and had made his position in his proposed enterprise clear and not to forget the importance of the railroad.

Mr. Strahorn left by the way of Bend Wednesday morning, going out in company with Frank Dibble who is familiar with the proposed route between Burns and Silver Creek and no doubt the gentleman gained considerable information on his way out.

The people of this vicinity are much interested in Mr. Strahorn's enterprises and he is going to find active support in this county. Every public spirited citizen realizes the bigness of the undertaking and what it means toward the development of this big interior country. However, the immediate needs of Burns are to have his first consideration. The railroad connection with the Gap must be made in the immediate future. The scheme to make this a link in the east and west line across the state is desirable and is given due consideration, yet, unless Mr. Strahorn will give positive assurance of the immediate connection of this town to the line now building into the Valley, we must look elsewhere for it.

We realize most forcibly the critical situation so far as this immediate territory is concerned are not going to sit by and see advantages taken of the situation that will be detrimental to the interests of Burns through delay. The line from Crane Creek must be constructed during the coming year in order to satisfy the citizens of this vicinity. This must go forward with the least possible delay in order that the big irrigation project may be given impetus and brought about with just as much speed as conditions will permit.
