**FARMERS MAY LEARN TO GRADE THEIR OWN GRAIN.**

A Four Weeks Course in Grading is Offered at O. A. C. To Help Them Prepare For Bulk Handling.

With the end of sack handling of grains in the Northwest comes the demand for a general knowledge of grain standards and grades by the growers, and this will be provided in the four weeks course in grain grading to be given during Farmers' short course at the State College, Jan. 7 to Feb. 2.

Farmers taking the course will work on samples from their own fields and from the markets of the State learning in what classes and grades their crops belong under the New State and Federal Grain standardization laws. It is believed that they will be forced to ship their grain in bulk because sacks will not be available at prices they can afford, and accurate grading is the basis of the bulk method.

Cereal disease and insect control, weed eradication, bean and potato growing and warehouse accounting will be taught in connection Warehouse and elevator men as well as farmers are planning to take the course.

Courses are also offered in general farming, dairying, farm machinery care and use, war-time home-making and farm accounting. Low railway fares are offered on all railway lines.

**CHICKEN FAT VALUABLE**

Do you throw away the body fat of poultry—big layers of clean, sweet, yellow fat around the gizzard and found elsewhere around the intestines of the chicken? If you do, say specialists of the United States Department of Agriculture, you are throwing away fat which French housewives consider the finest of fats for making cakes and especially puff paste, and which many housekeepers prize for its many good uses in cookery. In certain seasons in New York and other big cities this fat is so highly esteemed that it brings as much as \$1.10 per pound. So great is the demand for this fat that many people make a business of collecting it from butchers and others who dress poultry before delivering it to customers. Housewives would do well to insist on having it delivered if they buy their poultry dressed. By using chicken fat in cooking they can cut down the amount of fat they must buy for that purpose. To prepare it, try it out in a double boiler or other vessel set in hot water until the fat just melts away from the tissues and can be poured off. This fat becomes rancid easily and should be kept cool and covered like butter, and used in a very few days. Chicken fat, like goose fat, may be used in shortening cake, where the seasoning used will mask any flavor which the fat might have. It can also be used for frying the chicken itself or other meats and for warming vegetables, and in many other ways.

**A PEOPLE AROUSED.**

Whether or not the American people are fully aroused on all matters pertaining to the war, there can be no question as to their being wide awake to the importance of increased food production. As the figures on this season's crops become available, the results assume staggering proportions. Such crops the world never has before seen. The one item of Irish potatoes shows the amazing yield of 450 billion bushels. Corn is away up alongside of the tubers, and in all lines, except, possibly, wheat the figures have swelled far beyond anything ever known in this country of enormous yields.

The result should be a source of great encouragement to our people in many ways. It will tend to give us some idea of the immensity of the domain we are called upon to fight for in order to preserve its integrity. It must also convince that there can be no reasonable fear of hunger in such a land unless we lose either the inclination or the ability to tickle our soil to the yielding.

The result is also gratifying in that there is now a question of our being able to extend to our allies all needed supplies of food. Last spring this matter loomed darkly as one of the dire possibilities. That it no longer exists will tend to remove at least one of the sources of discontent. Once assured that we shall not want for plenty our people will view with willingness the exportation of supplies across the waters.

The result of the year's labors should teach one more lesson. We should remember that no task is so great but that with the proper perseverance and grit it may be accomplished. Also that there are very few achievements but may be improved upon if we can in a single season so largely swell the national production, we should in the next few years, with an arousing of well-known American pluck and ingenuity, be able to discount even that record. In fact it should teach us that we have not yet even imagined a limit to what we could accomplish.  
So, whatever matters we may have to give us disquiet, we may be thankful that we shall not hunger—that there is enough and to spare.

**LOANS AND SAVINGS.**

When the history of the American war loans is finally written into it will be written the account of a people converted from the extravagance to frugality, from reckless spending to prudent saving. It will contain the account of a nation that while giving freely of its wealth yet in the very act of giving, received more than it gave.

Yes, great as will be the money outlay necessary for the successful prosecution of this war, the solid enduring benefit to the people of this country will be indefinitely greater. In the first place, it has caused us to reach out for an equally huge supply. But unlike the flush periods of former years when the added resources have been produced, they have not been wasted in needless extravagance.

Anent the scarcity of coal, it is recalled that the old settlers refused to burn the stuff because it was too dirty. How times do change.  
Ever stop to think how miserable you would be if all your fears were to be realized? A jolly old editor kept this gem at the head of his paper: "I have suffered many misfortunes, most of which never happened." Quit worrying and go to WORK.

With potatoes rotting in the ground because it would not pay the farmers to dig them, and the people in the city unable to buy because of the high price, there would seem to be something besides potatoes "rotten in Denmark." What's the answer, anyhow?
