removals, and in several other instances committees have been enlarged.

Committees on lists and Estimates, Publicity, Speakers, Transportation, and any other committees necessary to carry out this important work will be arranged for without delay.

The chairman and manager have addressed the following letter to the several workers in the outlying districts:

When you are appointed a member of the Local Executive Committee for ALL WAR MEASURES, for..... district, which was at the time and in connection with the organization of the Third Liberty Loan Campaign was understood and intended that your committee was to be the permanent committee FOR ALL WAR WORK AND WAR DRIVES.

THE SECOND RED CROSS DRIVE commences on May 20th and ends on May 27th, lasting one week. This drive is now being organized by the WAR FUND EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE. This letter is to advise you and your committee to prepare for this drive.

In each district where there is a Red Cross Auxiliary, the Auxiliary is being asked by the Executive Committee to appoint a committee of five persons to co-operate with your committee in this most important work, and which is the solicitation of money and pledges of money for Red Cross work. This coming drive is not local, but is nation wide, and its reason is that the money received at the FIRST RED CROSS DRIVE has been practically spent. The Nation expected to raise \$100,000,000, and the quota that Harney County to raise, will be, probably, at least 7,500.00

The War Fund Executive Committee will render you all the assistance possible in carrying out the campaign. Some member or members of the Committee will visit your district before the campaign commences.

It is imperative that each committee member gives this matter his vigorous and personal attention in order that the highest results may be obtained.

GET YOUR COMMITTEE TOGETHER AND SEE THAT YOUR RED CROSS AUXILIARY APPOINTS ITS COMMITTEE AT ONCE IF THERE IS AN AUXILIARY IN YOUR DISTRICT) THEN GET THE COMMITTEES TOGETHER AND DISCUSS WAYS AND MEANS FOR WORKING YOUR ENTIRE DISTRICT TO THE BEST ADVANTAGE; THEN WHEN THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEMBER VISITS YOU THE BEST JUDGMENT OF YOUR JOINT COMMITTEE AND THE ADVICE CONTAINED IN THE RED CROSS WAR DRIVE MANUAL CAN BE HARMONIZED FOR THE BEST RESULTS.

Special effort has been made to place an equal number of men and women on the several committees throughout the County, and it is anticipated that this will be the means of more fully and completely reaching every person in the County for aid in this cause.

Remember that the Red Cross Drives are not based on assessments, but subscriptions come from the conscience and the heart. The American casualty lists are increasing day by day. The age limit of the Selective Service Law may be raised at any time. No one from youth to middle age knows what the next year will bring to him personally—no per-

son in the land knows what the next year will mean to family, neighbors, and kin. Our most solemn and sacred duty is to take care of our Armies and Navy. The Liberty Loans do not so much touch the suffering of war as do the RED CROSS DRIVES. Let your appeals for subscriptions come from the conscience and the heart and impress on everyone that we must be liberal to a fault when free will offerings are asked in the humanitarian cause of the Red Cross.
