HOGS PUT WASTE TO USE

If garbage in good condition is fed in proper surroundings, there is no reason why pork from this source should not compare favorably with that from grain-fed hogs. It has been found by investigators of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Reports in the possession of the Department show that where table scraps form all or a part of the pig's diet, the gain cost considerably less than the gains made by their grain-fed competitors, especially under present conditions. Approximately 15 to 20 pounds of garbage are required a day for fattening a hog of 125 to 200 pounds. It has been estimated that 4 tons of garbage are required to grow a pig to 200 pounds, the feeding period extending from 10 to 12 months.

In the heat of a Washington July no wonder the Senate was anxious for a recess. Their slogan for the last two or three days of the session was probably "Adjourn or burn."

WILL OREGON SUPPLY DEMAND FOR HORSES

Opportunity for breeders of heavy draft horses in Oregon, and particularly in the Willamette Valley is great, believes Wayne Dinmore of Chicago, secretary of the Percheron Society of America, who makes a study of horse conditions in the state and who was a visitor at the Oregon Agricultural College.
 "There is no question but that there will be a heavy advance in prices of heavy horses," said Mr. Dinmore. "My prediction is that grade mares weighing 1,800 pounds or more will bring \$500 each within five years. Geldings selling at \$300 in Chicago, are bringing \$1,000 in Great Britain. More than 1,000 Percheron-horses have been shipped from this country to Canada in the last 19 months—611 in the last seven months.
 "There is a demand for heavy draft animals which will increase. Breeding stock will command particularly high prices. The Willamette Valley should be in a position to supply this want. My impression is that it is an admirable country for the breeding of high class livestock. The pastures and grain crops are adequate and the grazing season is long and mild."

Fresh Beef Travels on a Rapid Schedule

Fresh beef for domestic markets goes from stockyards to retail stores within a period of about two weeks. Although chilled, this meat is not frozen; hence it cannot be stored for a rise in price.

A steer is dressed usually within twenty-four hours after purchase by the packer. The beef is held in a cooler at the packing house, at a temperature a little above freezing, for about three days.

It is then loaded into a refrigerator car where a similar temperature is maintained, and is in transit to market on an average of about six days.

Upon arrival at the branch distributing house, it is unloaded into a "cooler", and placed on sale.

Swift & Company requires all beef to be sold during the week of arrival, and the average of sales is within five days.

Any delay along the above journey means deterioration in the meat and loss to the packer.
