#### WANT WOMEN MOTOR DRIVERS

August 19, 1918. TO THE CHAIRMAN OF ALL CHAPTERS NORTHWESTERN DI-

In a letter received this date from Washington we are advised that twen ty-fiv women motor drivers for service in France are desired from this Division within the next six mouths These women will be used principally in Paris and in interior points for motor messenger service, ambulance service between stations and Red Cross Hospitals, and will also be used o a limited extent for Camion ser-

The Red Cross will pay their transportation. Women should be voluneers but if necessary will be allowed it the rate of 450 francs per month or expenses when out of Paris and 00 francs per month for expenses then in Paris.

Candidates for this service will be elected from the American Red ross Motor Corps where possible and there no Motor Corps organization xists applicants will be given opporunity of testing their qualifications by divisional directors of the Motor 'orps Service or someone by him elected for that purpose.

The special qualificatoins for this ervice are:

Certificate of First Division Red lross Motor Corps Ambulance and Truck Driver or successful passing of an examination in mechanics and first aid as specified for A. R. C First Division Motor Ambulance and Truck Drivers.

Candidates must also meet the usual qualifications for overseas service as to age (minimum 25 years, by order of War Department), loyalty and health.

While the number stated herein as desired for this service seems small we are advised "there is no doubt that additional calls will follow."

You are respectfully requested to bring this matter to the attention of all persons in your community likely to be interested and it is desired that you make an effort to assist this Division in supplying its full quota well within the limit named


