TO CORDIA WILSON, next of kin of Louis B. Garrett, a minor, and to all other next of kin if any such there be, and to all persons interested or claiming to be interested in the estate of said minor child:

IN THE NAME OF THE STATE OF OREGON: Whereas it has been made to appear to the Court from the petition of J. W. GARRETT, Guardian of Louis B. Garrett, a minor, filed herein on the 24th day of August, 1918, and praying therein for an order giving and granting said Guardian a License to sell certain real estate belonging to said minor child, that it is necessary and expedient and would be beneficial to said minor child that such real property should be sold;
