(Continued from page one) served and made up largely of home-grown products, if any are available.

In addition, Miss Minnie Kalbas, Red Cross specialist in home economics, here is such menu, which honors both the boy and the hungry and starving who declare:

Rustic Goose, Nut Dressing, Gray, Cranberry Sauce, Mashed Potato, Curled Celery, Porcupine Pear Salad and Dressing, Parker House Rolls, Butter, Plum Pudding with Cherries, Lemon Sauce, Coffee.

For the stuffing use 2 cups hot mashed potatoes, 1½ cups soft stale bread crumbs, ¼ cup thin cream, 1 finely chopped onion, 1 cup chopped chestnuts or filberts, 1 egg, 1½ teaspoons salt.

To curl celery, cut it into three-inch lengths, trim one end, split in small strips about two-inches toward center, and place in water to curl.

The porcupine pear salad is prepared by decorating large pear halves with blanched almonds cut into strips, and serving on leaf with fruit dressing as follows:

3 egg yolks, 1 cup fresh juice-orange, etc.—2 tablespoons sugar, and 2 tablespoons flour. Cook together until thick and cold in ½ cup cream, whipped.

Lemon sauce for the plum pudding is made by combining ½ cup sugar, 1 cup boiling water, 1 tablespoon cornstarch or ½ tablespoons flour, juice and gratings from ½ lemon. Serve with whole canned cherries.

THE FARM TRACTOR.
