FORMER HARNEY COUNTY CITIZEN DIES IN PORTLAND

It is with much regret The Times-Herald chronicles the death of Glen O. Hendricks which occurred at the family home at Portland on Thursday of last week. Mr. Hendricks was a well known pioneer citizen of this county, having come here in the early days and settling near Lawen where he was engaged in ranching and the stock business for years.

A letter to friends in this city announces that in addition to the children being with him at the time of his death, three of his brothers were present at the funeral: H. H. Hendricks, of Fossil; Ray Hendricks of Cottage Grove, and Robert Hendricks of Salem.

The following obituary notice appeared in the Portland Journal:

Glen O. Hendricks, who was born at Dallas June 3, 1857, died at the family home, 135 North Twenty-dricks had been suffering from third street, this morning. Mr. Hendricks disease for three years.

Mr. Hendricks was united in marriage with Miss Mary Hattie Markham at Yocalla, Oregon, July 4, 1882. To this union was born seven children, five of whom survive allup, Wash.; Mrs. Vivian Gray, Emmett, Idaho; Lillian L. Hendricks, Mary H. Hendricks and Glen O. Hendricks Jr. of Portland. There are two grandchildren, Vera Lorraine Gray and Wilbur Gray.

The family moved to Eastern Oregon in 1891, where Mr. Hendricks owned a stock ranch for a number of years. In 1914 they moved to Summer Wash., and lived there until 1916 when Mr. Hendricks' health failed.

He was a member of the Church of Christ.

Besides his widow and children he is survived by his aged mother, Mrs. M. J. Emerson, Cottage Grove, and by five brothers.

Funeral services were held at the Miller & Tracy chapel in Portland Saturday.
