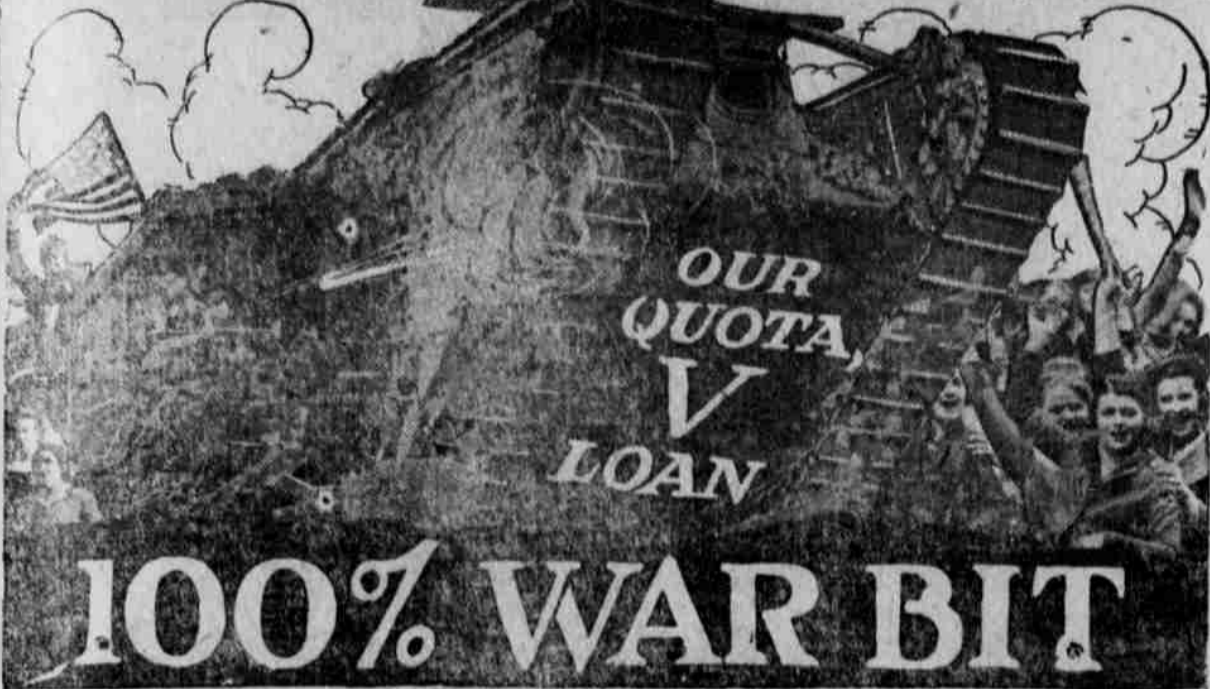


OUR COUNTY FACES THE LAST TRENCH

Daddy Pershing Waits for Him

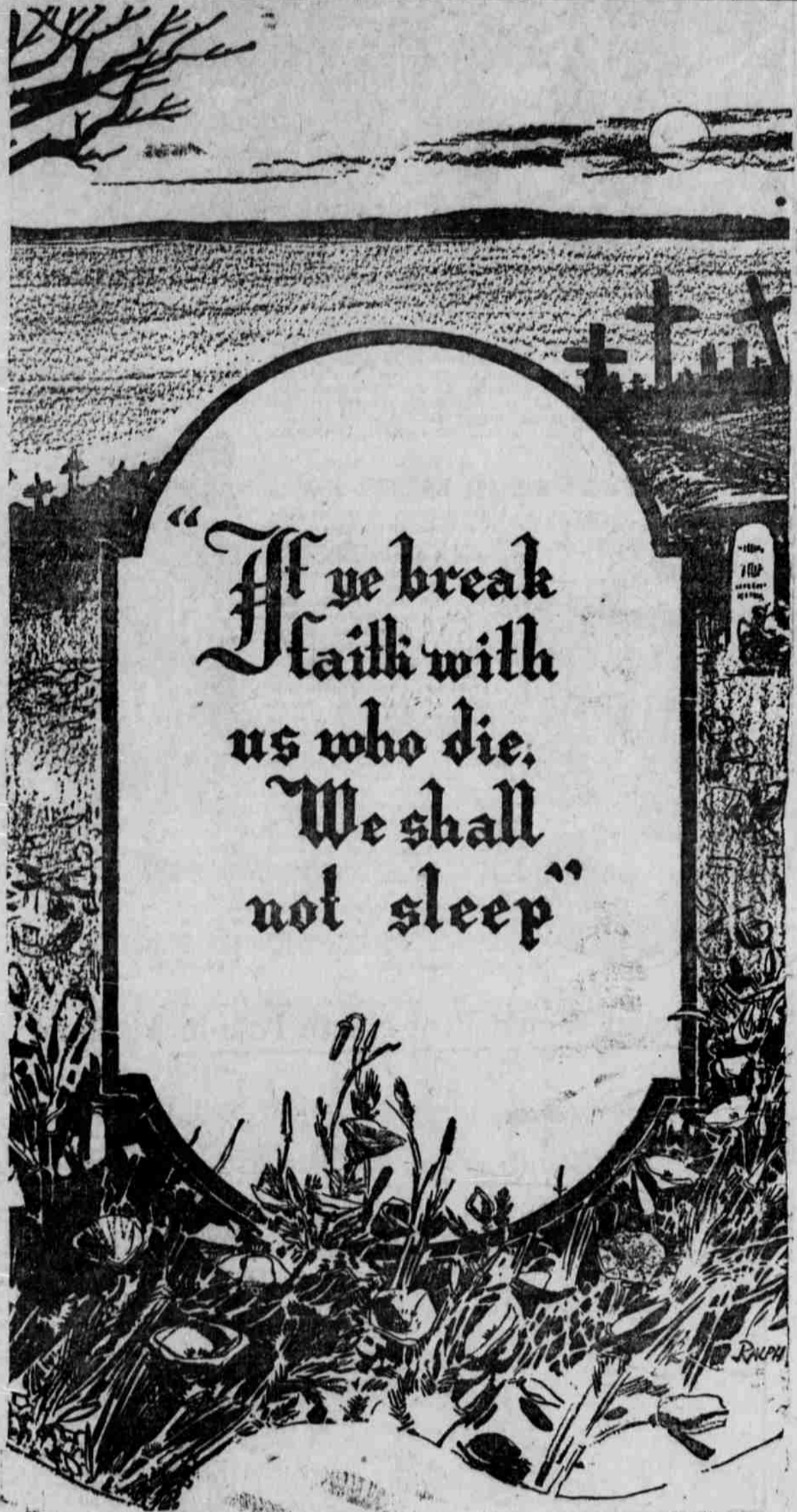
