noon and I suppose they were as much disappointed as we were.

About 5:00 p. m. on the 18th the NC-3 arrived at Ponta Delgada. When she had been sighted the destroyer Harding went out to meet her.

She had lost or cut loose her pontoons and her lower wings were torn considerably.

About 2:00 p. m. of the 20th the NC-4 came flying in amid the screeching of whistles and sirens and the firing of the Portuguese salute.

She came down in the water near the buoy, the Stars and Stripes were hoisted and she was secured just as the NC-3 had been.

On May 22nd I happened to be on deck in the morning when they were trying out her engines near us. All at once flames enveloped the after engine and my heart nearly stopped beating for a while.

On the morning of the 27th the crew of the seaplane were up early and tried out her engines till about 3:00 and then went in for breakfast.

The movie men were busy all the time on the platform of the range-finder and you will probably see pictures of it before long.

We left Ponta Delgada June 2nd and we are in New York again.

There is no country which can be compared with our own U. S. A. believe me.

and ending on the 5th day of September, 1917," and that with four publications, one made on August 5th and one on September 5th, the publications would not necessarily be made on four successive weeks and that either three of the publications of the paper on the dates between August 5th and September 5th, might not have contained the publication of the notice.

The court further holds that the petition is sufficient to confer jurisdiction upon the county court if the same and the notice of the presentation thereof had been shown to have been published as required by law.

As to the exclusion of the Hanley lands the court says: "Whatever may be the law on this point, the question of the exclusion of appellant's lands is not before us in this proceeding in a manner so that the same can be satisfactorily determined."

The proceeding is remanded to the circuit court with direction to remand the same to the county court for such further proceedings as may be deemed proper not inconsistent with this opinion.

Believe this well is going to be a producer of oil. Hope may be responsible for this view, but with the indications shown and the confidence manifested by those directly interested we feel that Harney Valley is soon to be known as an oil field.

During the present week the men in charge of the destinies of the oil well at Dog Mountain have given indications of renewing active work there. Last fall the drill at this well is believed to have penetrated the cap rock and was closed until further leases could be obtained. This has evidently been accomplished as men interested in the project are making preparations to begin work again.

President Nease of this company has announced that when they resumed operations there he would send in an experienced driller who understood how to bring in an oil well and thus avoid any mistake that might arise. With these prospects the people of this community feel very optimistic of the result of the prospecting for oil.
