During the present week the men in charge of the destinies of the oil well at Dog Mountain have given indications of renewing active work there. Last fall the drill at this well is believed to have penetrated the cap rock and was closed until further leases could be obtained. This has evidently been accomplished as men interested in the project are making preparations to begin work again.

President Nease of this company has announced that when they resumed operations there he would send in an experienced driller who understood how to bring in an oil well and thus avoid any mistake that might arise. With these prospects the peopole of this community feel very optimistic of the result of the prospecting for oil.
