PIONEER MAN BROUGHT HERE FOR BURIAL

Henry Caldwell died at his home at Plush, in Lake county, Thursday night, July 21, from Bright's disease. A telegram was received here yesterday morning by his brother Lee to that effect and also stated he would be brought to Burns for burial in the family lot and requested the grave be made ready. The body was prepared for burial by an undertaker at Lake view who accompanied the remains to this city and the funeral was held at six o'clock last evening immediately upon the arrival of the body.

Few of the people of this city knew of the death of Mr. Caldwell or of the funeral being held here. Rev. George Ward of the Nazarene church conducted the service which was attended by several of the pioneers and relatives. His wife and eight of their ten children were present at the funeral, two other children, Mrs. Mary Heck of Portland, and one son who has not yet been mustered out of the army service, were unable to be present, the former being ill at her home at Portland.

Henry Caldwell was 70 years old, being a pioneer of this country where he resided from the late 70's until 13 years ago when he removed to Lake county. He is survived by his widow and ten children, also one brother, Lee Caldwell of this city, and one sister, Mrs. M. H. Branton, also a resident of this place. The latter and her husband were camping over in the Stein's Mountain region but were reached by messenger and phone. They came right in upon receiving the word but did not get here until about 11 o'clock last night, too late for the funeral.

The widow and children left again this morning for Lake county as it is necessary that they get back home and to their respective duties. The sympathy of the many old time friends in this community is extended to them in their bereavement.
