## PEACE AT LAST

The citizens of Burns witnessed a novel sight recently; one they had never seen before, but which it is to be hoped, they will become accustomed to by frequent repetition.

A public meeting was held, presided over by the head of the Burns Commercial club, William Hauley, representative of the vast acreage held by himself, was at the meeting. The Pacific Live Stock company had representatives there, and the convention room was filled with Harney valley ranchers gathered from far and near.

It was not a meeting of protest or of contention but of harmony and prompt cooperation. It was not like other meetings in days gone by. It was such a meeting as spells progress and development for the community, long retarded and hampered by hostility between the cattle companies and the small ranchers striving to right wrongs.

Out of the meeting it is expected that a 10,000 acre irrigation project will take shape, to double or triple the production and the productivity of the community. All those present pledged themselves to stick together for the beneficial and construction of a water storage system of an estimated cost of \$5,000,000. Mr. Hauley, the chairman, and the representatives of the Pacific Live Stock company for that corporation, promised to cooperate in the opening of thousands of acres of new land to cultivation and profitable production. It was a meeting that will be recorded in the history of the Harney valley.

It is an outcome of the long effort made by the citizens of Burns and the state to bring the Pacific Live Stock company to book for the wrongs that corporation wrought against the school fund, and, as a result, against the settlement and development of the community. It points to the great good that may be expected to flow from the compromise that has been arranged between the state and that corporation. It also shows that the corporation is commencing to carry out its promise to the state in good faith.

Such a program will bring great changes to the Harney valley. It will dot its fertile lands with homes. It will make the community populous. It will make the acres now given over to range land yield with great abundance. It will change that district, wonderful in its promise, from a cow pasture to a thickly settled community. It marks the beginning of wonderful days for the Harney country.—Oregon Journal Editorial

## ECONOMY IN BEEF PRODUCTION COMES FROM BETTER BLOOD

amounts of purchased concentrates be provided. Cows that are milked should receive 1 pound of concentrate for every 3 to 4 pounds of milk produced, depending upon the fat content of the milk.

In the South, where velvet beans may be grown, this crop when planted with corn affords excellent pasturage for breeding cows after the corn has been gathered. Throughout the drought-exposed areas of the West it is unusual to save emergency supplies of feed, and as a result during the

drought many cattle owners are obliged to utilize the native range plants such as soapweed, sotol, bear grass, and prickly pear. These plants, ground up, serve to sustain the life of cattle where each mature animal receives from 20 to 25 pounds a day, when from 1 to 2 pounds of cottonseed cake is supplied as a supplement to the chopped feed, a fairly good ration is provided.

In the semiarid region of the southwest, sorghum plants provide excellentilage, while in the range sections of the Middle West it is essential to set aside considerable hay as emergency feed. During severe winters animals that are especially thin and weak should be separated from the rest of the herd and sheltered and fed. Cheap shelter not only saves feed but may save many cattle that would die if left exposed to wintry storms.

## How To Feed Beef

The farmers' bulletin mentioned discusses in detail the proper methods of feeding cattle in the various beef-producing sections in the United States, and also presents a wide variety of balanced rations suitable for use in each of these beefsteak-producing localities. It describes at some length the popular methods of handling yearling stockers, while it

also emphasizes the value as scavengers of hogs, yard mates of fattening cattle. The number of hogs to use depends upon the kind of cattle and the character and quality of the grain ration which is fed. Ordinarily one pig weighing 70 to 80 pounds to each three steers is required. When supplemental feed is provided the porkers, a few more may just as well be added, the chief consideration being to utilize all waste feed and to convert it into pork.

It isn't all smooth sailing for the farmer who elects beef production as his major activity. He, of necessity, has to battle against unfavorable weather conditions both for the production of crops with which to feed the animals and for the development of the beets that are red to consume the surplus feed and convert it into concentrated meat products. Furthermore, throughout certain sections of the Southern States, the Texas fever tick still threatens prosperity for the cattle feeders. The periodic use of arsenical dips which destroy the ticks is the only successful combative measure. Cattle lice also prey upon run-down, emaciated cattle and accomplish heavy economic losses. The lice can be controlled by dipping the cattle in coal-tar solutions in the fall before cold weather begins. The ox

warble or grub, as it is sometimes called, is the bane of the cattle hide industry, as these boring grubs eat into the carcasses with their tunnels, thereby puncturing the hide in many places where the skin is most valuable. About the only way that grubs can be controlled is to squeeze or cut them from the carcasses and destroy them. Cattle mange, ringworm, and blackleg all collect annual


