BURNS VISITED BY AN AIRPLANE ENGINEERS BEGIN WORK ON IRRIGATION PROJECT

Burns has seen its first flying machine. One came in from Portland last Sunday and was in evidence for the entire week, the landing field being near the William Stirling farm home just east of town.

The machine made a remarkable record coming in as it made from Portland to The Dalles in 55 minutes that being 15 minutes less than any record before known. From The Dalles to Prineville it was but one hour and 35 minutes and from Prineville to Burns one hour and 50 minutes.

C. V. Dudley is the owner of the machine and it was piloted by Capt. N. B. Evans, the young man having had army experience as a test pilot.

Many of the people of this vicinity took rides in the plane, sailing over town every day while it was here. The charge was \$15 for 15 minutes. The newspaper man didn't ride as that price was too much for his limited means.

It is understood the same people expect to return here for Chastanua week when it is hoped the price will be reduced so we can all ride.

OLD TIME HORSE AND MULE MAN ATTENDS CONVENTION

Col. I. C. Gallup, one of the best known horse and mule commission men in the entire United States, who has been in the business for a life time, was among those who were here for the big convention. Col. Gallup was formerly located in Omaha, being the head of the I. C. Gallup Horse & Mule Co. He is now connected with the Campbell & Reid and Western Sale Stables Co. also being the representative of the St. Louis Horse and Mule Market and the National Stock Yards, of Illinois. These are the largest horse and mule commission concerns in the world.

Col. Gallup expects to make his headquarters in Nampa, Idaho, during the present season and will be in this territory frequently soliciting consignments for his commission concerns. He stated in an interview with a representative of this paper that he anticipated a good strong demand for range horses during the coming season, even more favorable than last. It is his intention to have a special train of range horses out of Crane on July 29 for the St. Louis August 10 sales. The Colonel insisted that we would see better prices for range horses especially fat stuff, than for the past several years. Col. Gallup will have an ad in the next issue of this paper.

A meeting of the directors of the Harney Valley Irrigation District was held Wednesday at which time they authorized the employment of additional engineering forces to get into the field at once to work out some of the details necessary to completion of the investigation suggested by Engineer Hammatt in his report of last week.

One force of men will be in the field by Monday and will start work at the lower reservoir site. Two other crews will be put at work just as soon as they can be secured and properly outfitted for the work.

ELLIS IS THE NOMINEE FOR SENATOR

It is a source of pride and pleasure to the people of Harney county to find that their candidate for joint senator for Harney, Malheur and Grant counties has been successful. There were three aspirants for this position, two of them from Vale, Julien Hurley, the present incumbent, and C. M. Cradall, formerly representative of this district. Charles W. Ellis, the candidate from this county is reported to have been second in the race in Malheur county and his almost unanimous vote in this county overcame a big lead given Mr. Hurley in Grant. It isn't likely that Mr. Ellis will have any opposition at the polls at the November election.
