More rains.
Call phone No. 1 for the County Agent.
George Whiting left some splendid samples of alfalfa and Italian rye grass in this office this week.
Grasshoppers hatching out, many poisoning them—some are not.
Immediate action is required of all if this pest is to be eradicated.
Poison in any quantity desired can be had at cost through the office of the County Agent. Quick work will save your crops.
Plenty of poisoned grain is also available for squirrel poisoning. If you are trying to exterminate this pest and your neighbor cannot or will not, please notify this office and steps will be taken at once to have the work done. This applies to all, little or big local residents or absentee owners. It is cheaper for the owners to do the work if they can but if they cannot this office can and will, although the cost will come higher.
This county is exceptionally free from noxious weeds but several instances have been observed where they have taken hold (mostly on lands of absentee owners). The state laws of Oregon provide heavy penalties for allowing Russian Thistle,

Cookie burrs or White (Jim Hill) mustard to mature seed. Look over your fields and highways and see if any of these have made their appearance.

The hillside to the west of the business part of town is beginning to look something like a mining camp, so many wells are being sunk. But the dwellings going up show the stranger the progress the town is making.

County School Superintendents and High School Principals:
We have been asked so often as to how the examination is to be given where a student goes from a non-standard or non-accredited school into a standard high school, that we are sending to all the county superintendents and to all the standard high schools this ruling:
A standard high school does not prepare and give an examination at the end of the school year in the various subjects in which pupils, going from non-standard or non-accredited high schools, desire to have credit. A pupil who wishes to have credit for work done in a non-standard or non-accredited school must take an examination in the fall in the high school which he desires to enter. The principal of the high school prepares the questions and gives the examination, and should the student pass the examination, that high school becomes responsible for the preparation of the student in the subjects which it accepts as entrance requirements to that school. That is to say, that if a pupil desires credit for two years of English when he goes from a non-standard high school or non-accredited school into a standard high school, he must take an examination in those two years of English as outlined by the High School Course of Study. Should he pass the examination, the high school giving the examination becomes responsible for his work and gives credit for two years of English upon its records. The same is true with every other subject.

WORKMAN DIES FROM INJURIES
