Allen, assistant state club leader announces that live stock for placed with the boys and girls includes 84 dairy calves valued at \$14,795; 50 beef calves, \$12,280; 54 brood sows, \$4120; 141 weanling pigs to be grown for meat purposes, \$1180; and 87 pure bred pigs, weanling age, \$1760.

The price paid for the stock was small enough to make it possible for the young people to make a profit. The club leaders have put special stress on the fact that not only should an animal be pure bred, but of a good strain.
