People View Crops at Experiment Station

obtained from Mr. Shattuck later but he was kept very busy and the writer has not seen him since.
Many visitors were there from a distance and they surely profited by it. Farmers living in the immediate vicinity would have secured the same benefits but some failed to attend. That isn't a very good way to increase production or be as successful as one might. However, it has always been the case.

The picnic lunch at noon was a feature of the day that proved popular and was a decided help in the sociability of the people.
Following the lunch some excellent talks were made. J. T. Jardine, director of Experiment Stations of the state, was the first speaker. Mr. Jardine was paying his first visit to this station following his assuming the position with the Oregon Agricultural College. The gentleman gave a very practical talk in connection with the work and assured the people of his hearty cooperation in making this station all that it should be to the people of Harney county. He enlarged upon its importance to the community and showed how it was working to the interests and advantage of the farmers who profited by what it demonstrated. Mr. Jardine pointed out that the station should not be expected to be self supporting, in fact that it was not its purpose nor was it best for the community that it be so. It should not be in competition with the farmers of the community, according to Mr. Jardine. The fact that the station is using its best efforts to produce the best seed for use in the community, that its demonstrations are for the purpose of ascertaining what is best in the way of seed, methods of culture, etc., essentially makes it a place where the farmer turns for information. The failures of the station are just as important to the country as its successes, therefore it should not be expected to be self sustaining. Mr. Jardine said he might be temporary, that Supt. Shattuck might be temporary but that the people should see to it that the Experiment Station was a permanent fixture.
Prof. W. L. Powers followed Mr. Jardine with an instructive talk on soils and irrigation. He made some pointed remarks in connection with the duty of water and what could and should be accomplished by the people of this country. He enlarged

upon the irrigated crops at the station with a limited supply of water and pointed out the importance of the proper application of water. He said that we would always be short of water to properly cover the tillable soil of this big valley and for that reason we should use every drop as economically as possible. Prof. Powers said that with the completion of the present irrigation district project the importance of irrigation would be further demonstrated. He called attention to certain pamphlets which he and others had prepared and put out showing the advantages of cultivated crops over the natural meadows along the river, where by actual test they demonstrated that a cultivated crop required less water than the native grasses and the yield was considerably greater. With these figures before our eyes it would be folly to continue under present methods.

Prof. Powers further advocated pumping plants and gave the work of the plant at the station as an instance of the success of such a method of irrigation. He said that with the development of the country power lines would be attracted to the country and this would furnish a cheaper means of raising the water for irrigation where the gravity system was unable to supply water.

Waldo Geer favored the company with a reading following Prof. Powers talk.

Judge Will R. King was another speaker who gave some interesting figures on the development of a country through irrigation. Judge King was connected with the U. S. Reclamation Service for seven years and saw many changes under the magic touch of water. He is more or less familiar with this valley and its possibilities. He has had data before him on the present irrigation project under formulating stages of construction and he did not hesitate to give it his entire approval. He urged early completion and unhampered support of the undertaking. Judge King promised the citizens that he would make it a personal business upon his arrival at Washington D. C. to look into the present unsatisfactory mail service and see what he could do to help. He remarked that we should not blame others as much as ourselves for present conditions, for he said had we taken advantage of our resources and given them proper support we would have been much further advanced in the development of the country. had many more people, railroad service and mail service in keeping with a live country.
Taken in all it was a very profit-

able day for all who attended. It is confidentially expected that next year will see a greater interest taken in this day and more farmers attending.
