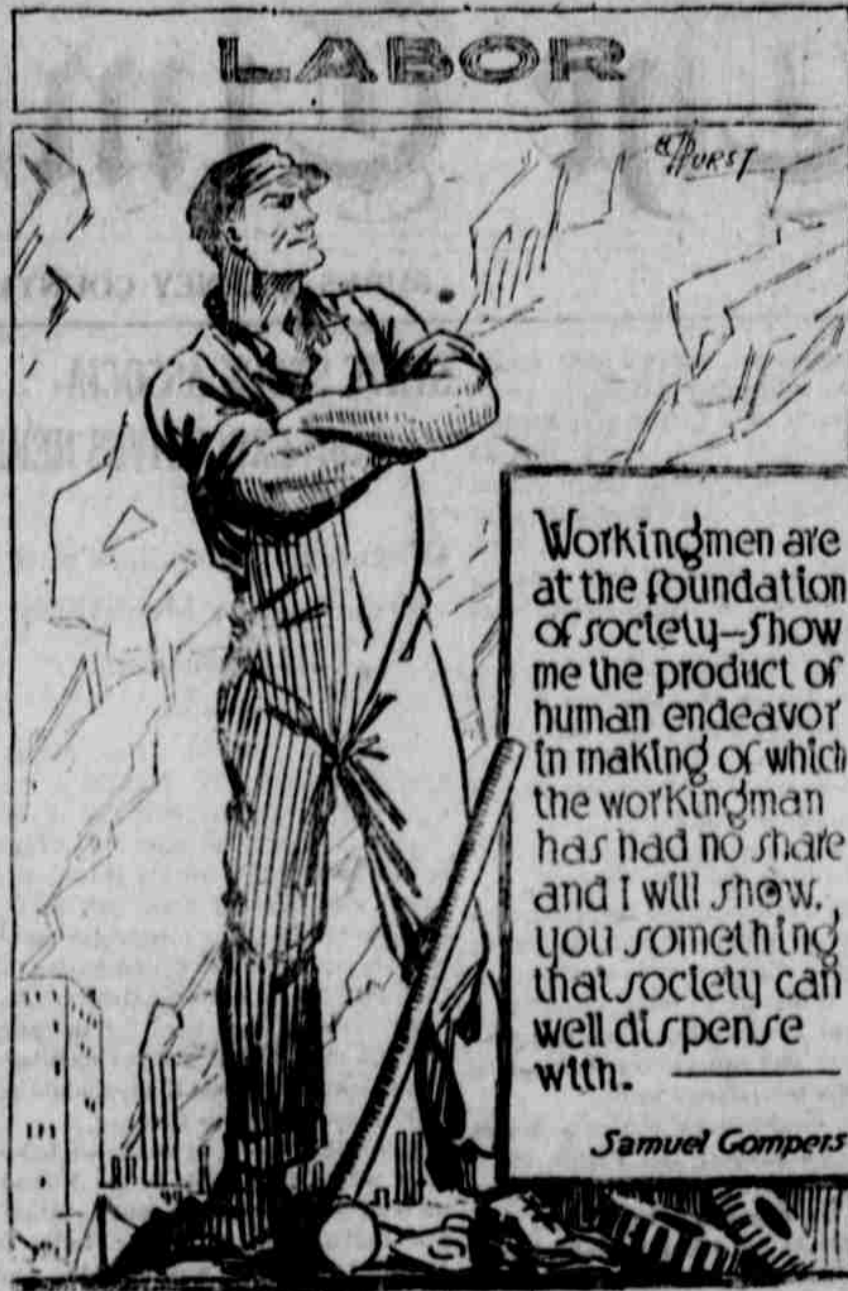

As a result of the conference of the American Farm Bureau Federation held at Chicago recently a committee of 17, representing all the nation's food producing groups, is endeavoring to formulate a standardized cooperative plan to knock the H. C. of L. Aaron Sapiro, California cooperative expert, gives a few of the results that have been brought about through the American Farm Bureau Federation. If middlemen are profiteering, Sapiro says that the remedy is legislation which California Cooperative Food Producers' Association is advocating. Mr. Sapiro is a firm advocate of labeling farm produce with the price it sold for as it left the farmer.
