SPEAK TO SCHOOL BOARDS ON THURSDAY

State Supt. Churchill will attend the teacher's institute in this city next week and it is his intention to speak to the school boards of the county on Thursday. Just what hour this is to take place has not been given this paper, but it would be well for those who desire to hear him to inquire of Mrs. Clark, the county superintendent.

Important Resolutions

Commercial clubs all over Oregon have received a copy of resolutions passed by a meeting of the irrigators of the state. These resolutions deal with a subject of vital importance to the citizens of this county and shows the attitude of men who have given the subject consideration. It is a matter that comes up for the approval or rejection of the voters at the November election. Better read them.

At a meeting of the Executive Committee of the Oregon Irrigation Congress held in Portland on 14th inst. a motion was unanimously carried that the Committee go on record as opposed to the passage of the Initiative Bill Numbers 316 and 317, entitled: "Roosevelt Bird Refuge Measure, and ceding and conveying to the United States all the right, title, claim and jurisdiction possessed by the State of Oregon in the land of Malheur Lake in Harney County," and that an effort be made to secure the defeat of this measure on the grounds that it is detrimental to the best interests of the State, and will prevent the reclamation of large areas of land, and that the Bird Refuge should be limited to that portion of the large area proposed to be given away by the State that is actually suitable for a bird refuge.

Attorney General Brown has rendered his opinion to the State Land Board that the lands involved are state lands and recommends that the State assert ownership that the lands may be secured and sold for the benefit of the state school fund.

State Engineer Cupper has filed his report against the measure, advising that the bill should be defeated and the matter worked out through the proper state departments to protect both the preserve and the reclamation of adjoining lands.

Mr. J. W. Cunningham of the firm of Barr & Cunningham, engineers for the Harney Valley Irrigation District (an 83,000 acre project north of the lake), joined in report against the measure on account of necessity

of drainage of district lands through a portion of the tract involved.

Mr. Fred F. Henshaw, District Engineer of the U. S. G. S., in charge of the water resources data of the state, made report to the Land Board that the water supply will not be sufficient to provide for reclamation of proposed lands and maintain the full area proposed for game purposes, and that drainage was necessary to save the lands within and surrounding the lake.

The state plan of reclamation contemplates the preservation of from eight to ten thousand acres as a permanent game refuge under state regulation and the sale and settlement of balance.

The defeat of the measure will save about 30,000 acres of good agricultural lands, of the value of from \$200,000 to \$300,000 to the state school fund;

Will permit of the proposed reclamation of adjoining lands;

Will preserve a reasonable area as permanent game refuge;

Will prevent the already large Federal reserves in the State being increased by 47,000, to be forever held from the tax list;

Will increase settlement and production and encourage railroad extension westward from Crane, Oregon.

We trust this report will be given due consideration by the members of your organization in voting on the referendum on this measure.
