Crane, on the eastern edge of Harney County, through the Malheur Canyon, another very expensive piece of construction work. Both these lines are now built past all engineering difficulties and expensive construction, and a connecting link between Bend and Crane would be over a practically level country and very cheap of construction.

WHEREFORE your complainants respectfully pray that you cause a hearing to be held to determine the justice of our contentions, to the end that the barrier against the progress of Harney County in particular and Central Oregon in general may be removed and the development of this Inland Empire may be made possible.
