The Way It All Started



All-Hallow Eve falls on the last day of October, the day following being All-Saints' Day, or All-Hallows.

This is the date of the last of three festivals held by the Druids, who in olden times were scattered over northern Europe. These festivals were observed on May 1, the time of sowing; June 21, the season of the ripening of the crops, and October 31, the harvest season.

One of the religious rites of the Druids consisted in maintaining, throughout the year, immense fires on stone altars erected upon eminences in honor of the Sun-God. On the night of Oct. 31, the Druids assembled at the altars in their snow-white robes, and at a given signal, during the absolute silence on the part of the multitude gathered to witness the ceremony, they solemnly extinguished the fires. New fires were then kindled, and as the flames leaped heavenward, the people raised a mighty shout, and then, obtaining live embers from the altars, they returned to their homes to extinguish the old fires left burning on their hearths, and kindle them anew with the sacred embers of the priests. This new fire was believed to protect each homestead from peril so long as it remained burning.

As the Druids faith faded in the light of Christianity, the heathen festivals lost much of their grandeur and former significance, and assumed a lower character. Gradually the simple country folk came to believe that on Oct. 31 the fairies forsook their hiding places to dance in the forest glades, while witches, goblins, and other evil spirits had revels in deserted abbeys, or plotted against mankind in the shadows of ruined castles and keeps.

By a very natural transition the Hallowe'en fire came to be looked upon as a charm against evil spirits; and even as late as the seventeenth century we learn that it was customary for the farmer to make the circuit of his acres brandishing a lighted torch, and chanting of some doggerel rhyme to protect his farm from evil during the coming year.

From the fact that these supernatural agents seemed so near at this

season, Hallowe'en was supposed to be the night of all nights for the prying into the mysteries of the future; and this is probably the origin of these games and ceremonies by which it is claimed that one's fate may be learned, at the same time procuring a great deal of innocent fun and flirtation for youths and maidens of every degree at a Hallowe'en celebration.

To the Voters of Oregon!

The taxpayers of Portland and Multnomah County are not only willing but anxious to provide the Port of Portland with needed funds for dredging our River Channel to the sea. The Committee that formulated what is known as the Port of Portland and Dock Commission Consolidation Bill under the numbers 310 and 311 on the ballot insisted, however, upon weighting down the measure with an enormously expensive real estate scheme, and by a formal vote turned down the request of taxpayers that the Swan Island scheme and the River Channel scheme be presented as separate measures. Refusing to be forced to swallow something they cannot approve, Multnomah County is expected to vote adversely to the whole scheme by an overwhelming majority. Having done this, they will then be ready to vote for any needed amount for improving our River Channels. A Committee of the City Club has submitted a detailed analysis of the measure showing that it means an ultimate expenditure of at least \$40,000,000.

Our Chamber of Commerce and other civic bodies with all of our river pilots and steamboat owners and others have protested against it. At least twelve former and present members of the Port of Portland and the Dock Commission have declared against it. A majority, if not all, of our City Commissioners oppose it. The Committee of 15 itself that drafted the measure is divided.

The Taxpayers of Portland Appeal to You

in a spirit of fair play to save this county from the imposition upon us of such an overwhelming and paralyzing debt as this measure contemplates. It would be deemed offensive if we gave expression to what we believe to be the selfish and ambitious political motives that have inspired the measure which is submitted with a distinctively deceptive title.

We simply appeal for fair play and a decent consideration of the hopeless plight in which this community will find itself if the measure carries. As citizens of outlying counties who will not have to pay a dollar of the debt imposed, we appeal to you to consider what would be your feelings if Multnomah County should try to impose a similar burden on you. Our interests in a general way are mutual.

It is our sincere judgment that the success of this measure will seriously retard, instead of promoting, the development of this port and that the state at large will in return suffer severely as a consequence.
