Mrs. Mary Kudlata Passed away at the Summit hotel on Friday morning a 3 o'clock. The deceased was born in Bohemia in 1850, and came to the U. S. in 1870.

Mrs. Kudlata was a woman whom to know her was to love her, for she possessed all the attributes that go to make up a strong christian character.

She came from a home of plenty in Wisconsin to bravely cast her lot

in Harney county with her two children, Rose and Frank who accompanied her here, and though she had never known what hardship was as it is found in the eastern Oregon homestead life, her courage never flagged, while others all around her gave up the struggle and left their homestead lands for better parts she still lived on, seeming even in the darkest hours—a rift in the clouds:

"Some feet halt, where some feet tread,
In tireless march, a thorny way;
Some struggle on where some have fled,
Some seek when others shun the fray."

So marked was her buoyant spirit under the most trying conditions in her "homestead" life, that the Author Anna Shannon Monroe has most graphically pictured her in her eastern Oregon novel—"Happy Valley."

To her intimate friends alone was given the privilege of knowing her fine christian virtues. Her humility was such that she ever veiled herself, and her delight lay in her loving service to others, thus in the words of the poet we find her character and

personality most beautifully revealed:—

"Hearts that are great are always lone,

They never will manifest their best
Their greatest greatness is unknown
Earth knows a little, God the rest"

The funeral services were held at the Catholic church at 9 A. M. today and interment took place in the Catholic cemetery.

OBITUARY (Contributed)

Theodore Roosevelt Oltman was born March 3rd, 1905 at Winona, Idaho. He resided with his parents and the other members of the family in the state of Washington and came with them to Burns about three years ago. In the latter part of September he was stricken with typhoid fever which later seemed to develop into quick consumption resulting in his death on the 13th of November at the age of fifteen years eight months and ten days. Every possible care was given at the King Hospital in Burns, but he slipped service to others, thus in the words of the poet we find her character and

of friends remain to mourn his loss. The mother had preceded him about two years, but of the immediate family there remain the father Mr. John K. Oltman, and the following brothers and sisters: Louis, Mrs. Gertrude Marsh, Mrs. Lillian Withers, William, Fred, Arthur, Alfred, Ruth, and George.

The funeral, which was held in the Nazarene Church, was conducted by Rev. L. B. Tracy, the pastor, and was attended by the Freshman class of the High School of which the deceased was a member, as well as by students from other classes, and from the public school, and by many sorrowing friends.

The remains were interred in the cemetery at Burns.
